## JDC Accepts Proposal for Arbitration of 1945 UJA

NEW YORK — The Joint Distribution Committee, at a special meeting of its executive committee held last Sunday, agreed to submit to arbitration the unresolved differences between the J.D.C. and the U.P.A. in an effort to reconstitute the National United Jewish Appeal for 1945. This action followed receipt of a telegram from Sidney Hollander, president of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds, requesting the two major organizations in the U.J.A. to submit their differences to arbitration.

In his telegram to Mr. Hollander, notifying him of the J. D. C.'s action, Paul Baerwald, chairman of the J.D.C. stated:

"In response to your telegram of February 23 urging that the J.D.C. and U.P.A. agree to submit differences to arbitration by mutually acceptable procedure, we refer to our letter of February 8th to you setting forth the unresolved differences which existed prior to the Cincinnati meeting on February 10th. Inasmuch as no agreement was reached as a result of the Cincinnati meeting, the differences remaining between the

parties still continue to be the following: The U.P.A. proposed a first division of ten million dollars in the ratio of sixty to forty percent or a first division of twenty-five million dollars in the ratio of fifty-eight to forty-two percent, with the Jewish National Fund traditional collection ceiling at one million one hundred thousand dollars, and that J.D.C. forego the six hundred thousand dollar countervailing amount. The J.D.C. proposed that the first division be twenty-five million dollars in the ratio of sixty to forty percent respectively, the J.N.F. traditional collection ceiling to be nine hundred thousand dollars and the J.D.C. to forego the six hundred thousand dollar countervailing amount. In view of the J.D.C.'s consistent desire to maintain the National UJA and recognizing the keen concern felt by the organized Jewish communities of this country for the continuance of the U.J.A., the J.D.C., at a specially convened meeting of its executive committee today, agreed to submit to arbitration by mutually acceptable procedure, the unresolved differences as indicated above."

## Laski Scores Big 3 for Failure to Discuss Jews

LONDON — Regret that the statement issued at the conclusion of the Roosevelt-Churchill-Stalin conference in Yalta did not include any assurance that anti-Semitism will be curbed by "decisive steps" after the war was expressed here by Harold J. Laski in an article on the conference of the "Big Three."

"I regret that no assurance was given to that people which has suffered as no other people has

suffered since Hitler's advent to power, that the United Nations will take decisive steps against a recurrence anywhere—even in Dorchester, Mass., of anti-Semitism," Mr. Laski writes. "For when Hitler and his gang are overthrown, there will still be a considerable number of duo-decimo imitators—Mosley in England, Father Coughlin and Gerald Smith in the United States and Mayor Camille Houde in Canada—who need to be told in unmistakable terms that when the war ends there ends with it the ghastly tragedy of anti-Semitism."

"I say this because there is, alas, a considerable volume of evidence to show that Hitler's poison has seeped into innumerable veins. None of the three men at Yalta have done much to relieve the tragic burden the Jews have had to bear since 1933. It would not have been too much to expect had they given this forlorn, unhappy people a pledge that they will not have suffered in vain."

### Red Cross Sabbath

Observance of Red Cross Sabbath in synagogues and Temples throughout the nation has been set for March 16-17. This date was fixed to enable Jewish religious leaders from coast to coast to call attention of their congregations to the great need for continued support of the humanitarian services of the Red Cross. Protestant and Catholic churches will observe March 18 as Red Cross Sunday.

Commending Red Cross activities and the 1945 War Fund campaign, the Central Conference of American Rabbis has issued the following statement:

"The Red Cross is the most appealing philanthropic cause before the American people today. Blood plasma...prisoners of war work...these services alone appeal both to the religious love of mercy and to the patriotic love of country. May the outstanding success of the 1945 Red Cross War Fund campaign demonstrate the spiritual caliber of the American people."

Jewish people throughout the country have supported the Red Cross, financially as well as by volunteer service in past years. Their continued wholehearted support is vitally needed during the coming year. Red Cross Sabbath, coming in the midst of the 1945 War Fund campaign, will provide an opportunity for rabbis everywhere to urge their followers to continue support of the Red Cross.

## Accuse Senator Of Slurring Jews

NEW YORK — Senator Hugh Butler (R., Neb.) has been accused of slurring the Jews by James A. Wechsler, editor of PM. The charge stems from a letter written by Senator Butler to OPA Administrator Chester Bowles in support of a price increase to a Nebraska manufacturer in which he asked that the case in question be referred to "someone who has had practical experience." "I note the order was signed by a lady assistant," the Senator wrote. "Perhaps she is acting for you and did not pass on the application. But if she didn't I'll wager that some Goldberg or some other BERG acted on it."

## Distribute Gift Package to Servicemen in R. I. Camps

## Release Figures on Jewish Casualties

NEW YORK — The first reliable indication of the number of Jews surviving Nazi occupation comes from an official Moscow report to the World Jewish Congress that in 38 liberated Russian and Polish cities and towns the aggregate Jewish population has been reduced from a pre-war 400,000 to 3,122, less than 1 per cent, Dr. Stephen S. Wise, president of the Congress, disclosed this week.

The information is the result of a comparative census by the Jewish Anti-Fascist Committee in Moscow, the only organization officially qualified by the Soviet Government to represent Russian Jewry. It gives a picture, according to Dr. Wise, of the persecution of Jews by the Germans during their occupation of Eastern Europe.

The Conference will request the United Nations to recognize the justice of the Jewish claim for representation on all agencies that may be established to deal with postwar reconstruction and organization, in accordance with a resolution which was adopted by the delegates at the first session of the Conference in New York in 1943. That resolution provided that the "Conference requests the recognition by the United Nations of the justice of the Jewish claim for representation, for the purpose of advice and cooperation on agencies that have been and will be set up by the United Nations to deal with the problems of relief, rehabilitation, resettlement, and other aspects of postwar reconstruction."

## A NEWSPAPERMAN:

Story of a Song: Once upon a time (March, 1943) songwriter Johnny Burke dined at the home of Harry Lillis Crosby.....Gary, oldest son of Crosby, was spouting monosyllabic thumb-noses at the principles of American education. In sum, he hated school..... Burke waved a worldly finger..... "My boy," he said, "you should be glad you're going to school. How would you like to be a fish? A fish can't read or write or go to ball games. All he can do is swim around and when he gets tired of swimming one way, he turns around and swims the other. If you like that sort of life, you might grow up to be a fish"..... Mr. Burke was impressed with his own philosophy.....He hastened to his partner, Jimmy Van Heusen, and repeated the dissertation on fish.....As a result, "Swingin' on a Star" was born and cast in "Going My Way," starring Bing.....Soon after the picture premiered the ditty made The Hit Parade and stayed on it for 20 straight weeks.....It became a minor national anthem with kids who asked kin if they'd like to be a fish or a mule..... Clergymen used the theme in sermons, and Joe E. Lewis parodied: "Would you like to hang on a bar, with a dame like Hedy Lamarr?" Very soon a book on the theme will be published. They may make a film based on its story, too..... Anyway, that's what came of a kid saying he didn't like school and why J. Burke and J. Van Heusen pay surtaxes.

We have just finished Noel Coward's Middle East Dairy, and the following paragraph in it belongs here, considering Coward's recent "jam" over his comment in the book about Brooklyn soldiers..... "At ten o'clock," he observes, "I went to call on General Eisenhower. He combats untiringly the little cracks and lampoons and jokes spread by the British against the Americans and vice versa. I believe he even sacked an important member of his staff for making a minor contribution to this dangerous, subversive racket.

## To Seize Property Of Bulgar Quislings

SOFIA — The property of the Bulgar quislings sentenced for treason will be turned over to a special fund to compensate Jews for property lost by them through Aryanization. This will also function as a pension fund serving the orphans and widows of Jews deported by the quisling regime to Germany's death camps in Poland. 1 egg, well beaten  
2 teaspoons grated orange rind  
1/8 teaspoon almond extract  
1 1/4 cups sifted flour  
2 teaspoon baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
3/4 cup orange juice  
3/4 cup milk

Blend shortening and sugar. Add egg and beat well. Stir in grated rind and flavoring. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Add to creamed mixture alternately with orange juice and milk, being careful not to overmix. Spread in a greased pan and cover with the following topping:

1 cup corn flakes  
2 tablespoons sugar  
2 teaspoons grated orange rind  
1/8 teaspoon allspice  
1 tablespoon melted butter

Crush the cornflakes into fine crumbs; mix with the sugar, orange rind, allspice and butter. Sprinkle over the coffee cake. Bake in a moderate oven about 20 minutes or until done.

NEW YORK — Rabbinical schools and rabbis were advised by the Synagogue Council of America not to fill the pulpit vacancy at Congregation Ahavath Israel, Kingston, N. Y., whose Rabbi Harold Englander left after the Congregation's President repudiated his protest against relating the nativity story to children at public school. Rabbi Ahron Opher, speaking for the Synagogue Council, said that "no (rabbinical) institution or self-respecting rabbi would respond" to the Congregation's request.

Rabbi Opher revealed, at a meeting of the three congregations, that the action taken by Congregation Ahavath Israel "worsened their position in the community and did great harm to the prestige of the spiritual leadership of American Jewry; that the decent Christians had indicated that the Congregation showed deplorable lack of respect for its spiritual leadership."
