Release Figures on **Jewish Casualties**

NEW YORK — The first reliable indication of the number of Jews surviving Nazi occupation comes from an official Moscow report to the World Jewish Congress that in 38 liberated Russian and Polish cities and towns the aggregate Jewish population has been reduced from a pre-war 400,000 to 3,122, less than 1 per cent, Dr. Stephen S. Wise, president of the Congress, disclosed this week.

The information is the result of comparative census by the Jewish Anti-Fascist Committee in Moscow, the only organization officially qualified by the Soviet Government to represent Russian Jewry. It gives a picture, according to Dr. Wise, of the persecution of Jews by the Germans during their occupation of Eastern
