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## Montor Denies Sharett Ultimatum

JERUSALEM—Henry Montor, executive director of the Israel Bond Drive organization in the United States, who is visiting Israel, denied as absolutely false reports circulating here that when Israel Foreign Minister Moshe Sharett was in the U. S. he had given Mr. Montor an ultimatum to reach agreement with United Jewish Appeal leaders on co-ordination of the two drives or else resign from the bond organization.

Mr. Montor said that he and Mr. Sharett had had "most friendly and most pleasant" conversations on the situation, and that the bond drive organization is "striving wholeheartedly" to achieve good relations between the drive and the U. S. A.

## Egyptian Revolt No Danger To Israel

LONDON—Israel is in no danger of an attack from Egypt as a result of the Army coup which seized control of the Arab state, informed observers in Britain said. Neither do these circles expect any trouble between Egyptian forces and British troops based in the Suez Canal area.

General Mohammed Nguib, who heads the Army group responsible for the revolt, has an unimpeachable military record, it was stated here. During the war with Israel he was wounded three times.

Meanwhile, it is reported that the Israel Army this week began its summer maneuvers to test newly-acquired material and newly-learned techniques.

The acquisition of new equipment by all services and the completion of training courses has put the troops in a good position to repel possible attacks by the Arabs who, General Yigal Yadin, Army Chief of Staff, pointed out, have been purchasing new arms without a halt. He reiterated his warning that if the Arabs re-open hostilities the battle will be carried into their territory.

### TO REPLACE McCLOY

BONN — The appointment of Walter J. Donnelly, new U. S. High Commissioner for Austria, in the near future to succeed John J. McCloy as High Commissioner for Germany was predicted here by a top U. S. official.

## U. S. Against Plan For Moving Israel Office to Jerusalem

WASHINGTON — The United States has notified the Government of Israel that America would not view favorably the transfer of the Israel Foreign Ministry from Tel Aviv to Jerusalem.

This notice was conveyed to Israel in an aide memoire presented to the Foreign Ministry in Tel Aviv. The document indicated that the United States Government has no intention at present of transferring its embassy from Tel Aviv to Jerusalem.

The aide memoire noted with concern an Israel announcement May 4 regarding transfer of the Foreign Office to Jerusalem. It said the United States will continue to adhere to a policy insisting that there should be a special international regime for Jerusalem which will not only provide protection for the Holy Places but which will be acceptable to Israel and Jordan as well as to the world community.

Israel was told that, since the Jerusalem question is of international importance, the United States believes that the United Nations should have an opportunity to reconsider the matter with a view to devising a status for Jerusalem which would satisfactorily preserve the interests of the world community and the state directly concerned.

## U. S. Raps Nazi Amnesty Act

VIENNA — The American High Commissioner for Austria expressed dissatisfaction with the laws passed by the Austrian Parliament restoring property and civil rights to more than 20,000 former leading Nazis.

"Nazi victims should be given consideration prior to Nazis," High Commissioner Walter Donnelly stated in commenting on the laws, which can be vetoed by any one of the four occupation powers.

The new amnesty laws were adopted despite an appeal by the Vienna Jewish Community to the coalition parties not to pass them. Under these laws, thousands of Austrian Nazis up to the rank of colonel will get back their properties and will be reinstated in their civil status.

### DEMAND RETIBUTION

NEW YORK — The Christian Hebrew Alliance, an organization claiming to represent thousands of Jews who had become converted to Christianity, has submitted a memorandum to the Federal Government of Germany demanding 50 million German marks from the restitution settlement with Israel. It was disclosed here by the Jewish Morning Journal in a report from its London correspondent. The decision to make restitution demands on Germany was reached at a recent conference of the converts at Hamburg.

NEW YORK—The Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds reported that federations, welfare funds and community councils which have taken action to date on the issue of greater national coordination in the work of Jewish groups engaged in combating anti-Semitism in this country, have all—with the exception of two—endorsed the resolutions adopted to this effect by the National Community Relations Advisory Council and by the C.J.F.W.F.

The two community organizations which differed from the others are the Jewish Community Council of Los Angeles and the Jewish Federation of Youngstown.

In Detroit, the report said, the Board of Governors of the local Jewish Welfare Federation endorsed the recommendations of the Evaluation Studies Committee on division of labor, and the recommendations of the committee on financing for a national budget review of the community relations agencies. There was only one dissenting vote.

### Boston 14-4

In Boston, similar action was taken by the Board of the Combined Jewish Appeal with a vote of 14 to 4. It expressed the hope "that through negotiation and conciliation unanimous agreement on these issues may be achieved among the national and local agencies." In Cleveland, the vote of the Assembly of the Jewish Community Federation was 12 to 13.

The Greater Miami Jewish Federation Board of Governors approved the action of the Evaluation Studies Committee.

### Urges 3 Goals

The Jewish Welfare Fund of Milwaukee approved the principles of the C.J.F.W.F. General Assembly and of the Evaluation Studies Committee. The vote on division of labor and strengthening the N.C.R.A.C. was 14 to 3, the vote on improved financing through national budget review was unanimous.

The Memphis Jewish Welfare Fund unanimously endorsed in principle the recommendations of the report by Dr. Robert M. MacIver, and the subsequent action of the N.C.R.A.C. and the C.J.F.W.F. It called upon all concerned with Jewish community relations to join together in a spirit of cooperation to achieve these desirable objectives: 1. Joint program planning and division of labor among national agencies to prevent duplication and needless expense. 2. A realistic budgetary plan to prevent confusion and needless competition for the welfare dollar. 3. The strengthening of N.C.R.A.C. as an instrument for overall planning.

As examples of the other federations, welfare funds, and community councils, both large and small, which have taken official action calling for improved planning and coordination of national community relations work, usually with division of labor and improved financing, the C.J.F.W.F. reported New Haven, Rochester, Worcester, Bridgeport, Akron, Springfield (Mass.), Oakland, Fort Worth, San Antonio, Little Rock, Des Moines, Kansas City, St. Paul, Sioux City, Canton, Flint, New Britain, Holyoke, Camden, Watertown, and others.

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## Israel Spurs Competition to Speed Oil Drilling

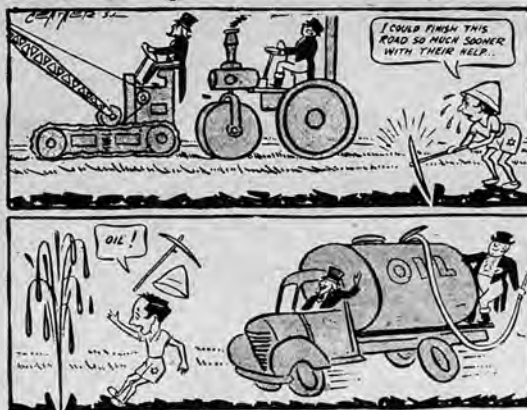
JERUSALEM—Israel's new oil legislation is designed to speed up the exploration and exploitation of oil resources and foster competition among foreign oil companies while preventing any monopolies, reports Dana Adams Schmidt in the New York Times.

While no official statement has been issued, and secrecy is being observed in Government headquarters, there are good grounds for believing that it will not take long before rich oil deposits are located in different parts of the country. Prospecting for oil, in which Swiss, British and American experts are participating, confirm that there are oil deposits.

## Influx of Capital

Israel economists have expressed the view that the discovery of rich oil deposits would completely transform the whole economy of the country, and bring much nearer Israel's economic dominance in the Middle East.

Israel R. Kosloff, fuel adviser to the Ministry of Finance, explained that the oil bill, which experts have been drafting for years, did not follow the pattern of laws of any particular country, although

it included elements of United States, Canada, Venezuelan and Peruvian laws. The text had been examined by some twenty prominent United States oil men and revised by officials here.

## "Race Against Time"

Kosloff said for this country it is a race against time. He referred to the race to make Israel self-supporting.

Under the oil law, a prospective investor may get a thirty-year lease when he makes a discovery.

A single license may not cover more than 100,000 acres.

The lessee must pay as royalty one-eighth of the market value at the wellhead of the petroleum produced and pay a rental for each 250 acres leased varying from 5 pounds Israeli in the first years to 40 pounds in the fifth and each succeeding year. In addition, under Israeli's tax laws, he will pay 50 per cent of the net profits to the Government. All payments will be in Israel pounds—not in foreign currency.

Rabbis Warn Against  
Attendance at Seances

LONDON—The mounting membership of the Jewish Spiritualistic Society is causing wide concern in Jewish religious circles, it was disclosed with an announcement that the London rabbinate was planning action to discourage attendance at seances.

The organization is said to have a membership of about fifteen hundred. The rabbinate has declared that the seances were in conflict with the ethical concepts of Judaism and that Jews should keep away from them.

## Airline Halts

## Magazine Distribution

NEW YORK — Pan American World Airways has halted the distribution to its passengers in Germany of Revue, a Munich illustrated magazine, following protests from the World Jewish Congress that the periodical "contained very thinly disguised neo-Nazi propaganda." It was announced here by Dr. Maurice L. Perlzweig, international affairs director of the worldwide Jewish organization. In announcing that the Revue would no longer be carried on aircraft operated by Pan American Airways in Germany, Paul T. Rennell, Atlantic Division sales manager of the airline, expressed appreciation to the World Jewish Congress for calling this matter to the company's attention.

Former Army Officer  
Writes Violently  
Anti-Semitic Book

WASHINGTON — A violently anti-Semitic volume, "The Iron Curtain Over America," is attracting considerable attention here because of the prestige and former official position of its author, Prof. John Beaty, Dallas, Texas.

Beaty, who has lectured in several American universities, served in the Military Intelligence during World War II, with the

rank of colonel.

The book, which denies that Jews stemming from Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, questions Israel's bid for restitution from Germany and seeks to deny that the Nazis exterminated most European Jewry. The bulk of East European Jews, according to Beaty, escaped ahead of the Nazis into Soviet Russia. Some of them today, he said, may be part of "the Jewish force on the Iranian frontier." Others, he asserts, "form the hard core of the new ruling bureaucracy in satellite countries."

He writes that "in 1948, strong with Soviet armor and basking in the sunshine of Soviet sympathy, 'Israeli' troops born mostly in Soviet-held lands, killed many Arabs, and drove out some 800,000 others, Christian and Moslem."

NEW YORK—Frank L. Weil, honorary president and for ten years president of the National Jewish Welfare Board, has been named chairman of the Jewish Community Center Centennial Committee, it was announced today by Irving Edison, president of JWB. The enter centennial will commemorate the 100th anniversary of the establishment of the first Jewish Community Center, the Baltimore YMHA, founded in 1854.

### New Housing To Be Financed Locally

It was revealed today through the recording of a mortgage from Naval Garden Apartments, Incorporated, to the First Federal

Savings and Loan Association of Providence that additional housing facilities are being made available through a lease from the United States of America, through the office of the Secretary of the Navy, of a location for the erection of 52 units.

The units to be built are of the family type, and the project will be adjacent to the Anchorage, already built and successfully operating at Middletown, Rhode Island. Naval personnel will have a preference in renting of the project.

The owners of the project are Naval Garden Apartments, Incorporated, and the construction is to be done by Mitola Brothers, Inc. The amount of the mortgage, as disclosed by the papers filed, is \$421,200. The rental specified in the lease calls for \$100 per annum, which was arranged to facilitate provisions for additional housing so badly needed in the area.

The mortgage is insured by the Federal Housing Administration. ## FOODS to Remember

by LEAH LEONARD

Summer heat often means listless appetites, especially with the young fry. One needs to stretch the imagination a bit for something that is "zippy," especially for the principal meal of the day. There's nothing like the following recipe which is a favorite with Romanian Jewish homemakers. It picks up even the most jaded mid-summer appetite. And it is so easy to prepare.

### SWEET-SOUR MEATBALLS

- 1 pound chopped beef
- 1 medium onion
- 1 carrot
- 2 eggs
- 4 tablespoons bread or cracker crumbs

### 1/4 teaspoon garlic salt

Combine the ingredients in the order listed and let stand while preparing the following sauce:

### SAUCE

- 3 tablespoons vegetable shortening or oil
- 1 small onion, diced fine
- 1 cup tomato puree
- 1 cup hot water
- 1/2 cup lemon juice or mild vinegar
- 1/4 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 cup light or dark seedless raisins
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

Heat the shortening in a saucepan and saute the onion till light brown. Add the other ingredients and let simmer 5 minutes or till the raisins are soft and puffed. While the sauce is simmering, form the meat mixture into balls the size of walnuts and brown them in 3 tablespoons shortening or oil in a frying pan.

Combine the browned meatballs with the sauce and cook 30 minutes over moderate heat. Serve hot, with steamed or boiled rice, mashed potatoes or on a bed of spaghetti.

Or, make Mamaliga! Serves 4.

### MAMALIGA

(Cornmeal Mush)

- 1 cup coarse yellow cornmeal
- 1 cup cold water
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups boiling water

Combine the cornmeal and cold water in the top of a double boiler. Add the salt and stir in the boiling hot water. Place the container over low heat and cook till it bubbles, stirring constantly. Place over hot water and continue cooking 10 minutes or till the Mamaliga stands away from sides of pot when shaken.

Serves 4.

## Panorama

By DAVID SCHWARTZ

Israel's Hazari is here. That's Hebrew for weather forecaster. The man everyone wants to throw something at when there's too much rain. Leo Krown, head of the weather forecasting bureau of Israel has an advantage in this respect. He is always prepared to offer the people every morning a variety of weather. We gather from Mr. Krown that Israel has more weather than most countries and you can take your choice.

The Israeli weather forecaster is an American native. Born in Brooklyn and a graduate of Brooklyn College, he was for a time instructor in meteorology at the University of Chicago. After the second World War, in which he helped provide the weather for American aviators, he moved to Israel, became a member of the Weather Bureau of Palestine under the Mandatory government, later joined the Jewish liberation forces and became the head of the Israel Weather Bureau.

The reason Israel has such a variety of weather, the Israeli forecaster says, is because of the land's peculiar geography, embracing in a comparatively small compass, ocean, mountains and a desert, each of which has a very decisive effect on the temperature.

If you are freezing in Jerusalem in winter—and this is possible, take a ride down to Tel Aviv an hour away, and you can throw off your overcoat, strip to shorts and play a game of tennis or go swimming.

In the summer you will probably want to return to Jerusalem. Its high altitude 2,500 feet above sea level and low humidity make it the ideal city for Mr. Krown.

Another cool spot in summer is Safed, ancient center of the Jewish mystics. The cool breezes there, we gather, are conducive to meditation on the higher things. It's a good place to have in mind if you wish to write another Zohar, although of late, it seems the mystics have been replaced by artists. Safed is the place where the Israeli Greenwich Village is located.

The Negev has another type of weather. There the sun bakes you like pudding during the day but at night it's good to have the fire going.

Weather forecasting, according to Mr. Krown, has become especially important of late in Israel on account of aviation. The Lydda airport near Tel Aviv has become one of the world's great airports, serving 17 foreign air lines beside Israel's El Al.

But Mr. Krown is not in America about the weather. He has accepted a special assignment for a brief time to organize the office of the Jewish Agency of the P. A. T. W. A. (Professional and Technical Worker's Allyah). There is a great shortage of trained technicians and professional workers in Israel. Not so many years ago, there was a complaint that there were too many doctors in Israel. It was feared that there might not be enough disease to go around. But the situation has greatly changed. The great immigration of Oriental Jews, few of whom

have any technical backgrounds, and the general speeded up development which is taking place, has brought around a great shortage of doctors, mechanics and nurses.

The P. A. T. W. A. is specifically designed to give such American trained personnel who wish to emigrate to Israel, vocational guidance including information regarding living conditions, help in getting employment in Israel and advice concerning transportation, and housing. Any technician desiring to move to Israel thus stands in a position of being saved many difficulties in making the new adjustment. According to Mr. Krown, many Americans have made remarkable adjustments. There are many difficulties, he admits, but there is compensating great satisfaction, he declares, in living in the present dynamic environment in Israel where one can feel the surge and throb of a developing new country.

## Britain to Investigate Kosher Meat Prices

GLASGOW—The high price of kosher meat in Britain—which is a sore point with Jewish housewives—will be fully investigated by the Glasgow Jewish Representative Council. Following several prosecutions of Jewish butchers by the Ministry of Food for price over-charges, the Council threatened to suspend kosher meat licenses for repeated convictions.

### Miss Israel Returns To Teaching Job: Thrilled With Tour

Following a three and a half month visit to the United States during which she helped raise substantial funds for the United Jewish Appeal, Michal Harel, Israel's 20-year-old beauty queen and holder of the "Miss Israel of 1952" title, departed Sunday on a

Sabena Airlines plane from New York International Airport enroute home to Jerusalem via stopovers in Brussels and London.

The beautiful young Good Will Ambassador termed her visit to this country "one of the most wonderful things that ever happened to a young person from a young country like my own."

"I came to the United States to tell the American people about Israel," she declared, "but I am going back to tell my own people about the wonderful people of America."

Miss Harel noted that she purposely delayed her departure to witness the July 4th celebrations of American independence "to make up for the fact that I missed my own country's birthday at the end of April."

"It's a wonderful feeling to enjoy a holiday for freedom in a country which has done so much for the freedom of my own," she declared.

The youthful Israel beauty queen, who visited 40 of this country's largest cities, addressed upwards of 25,000 people, and covered a total of 15,000 miles in doing so, succeeded both in raising many millions of dollars for the United Jewish Appeal and in winning friends wherever she went.

### Coddling Former Nazis

Passage by the Austrian Parliament of a law restoring property and civil rights to some 34,000 former Nazis is not only a betrayal of democracy and the faith of the Western Powers in Austria but an ominous indication, as aptly stated by Dr. Israel Goldstein of the American Jewish Congress, that that country has "embarked on a policy aimed at the complete legal rehabilitation of Nazi criminals and of open anti-Semitism."

What makes the situation in Austria extremely alarming is the shameless wooing by all political elements of the electoral support of the unrepentant Nazis (as if they were the dominant force in the political life of the country.) If that is the situation, it can only be concluded—and here we again quote Dr. Goldstein—that "Austria can easily become the focus of anti-Semitic and pro-Nazi infection for all of Europe and a center of international anti-Semitism if prompt measures are not taken by our government, as the leading member of the Allied Council responsible for occupation policy."

Under the occupation status, Austria's laws are subject to approval by the Allied Council. It would seem that the Allied Council could make no greater contribution to democracy and decency than by vetoing the latest act of the Austrian Parliament.

The attempt to curry favor with the Nazis at the expense of their victims is as immoral as it is unjust.

### ABOUT A MARRIAGE

"Well," the gentleman was saying, "let's take my own case." I may as well call him Mr. O because he was built round and stubby like an O.

#### 'Like Cain'

He had called on me on account of a matter he had just read in the Jewish press. "This," he said, "makes me look like Cain or, anyway, an accursed son of Cain."

Mr. O meant the curse that was put on Cain after he killed Abel. "The Lord said unto Cain, and now art thou cursed from the earth... a fugitive and a vagabond shalt thou be on the earth."

Mr. O himself was quoting these words and I mention that fact to suggest how Biblically Jewish he is. I find in my Bible that after Cain had received this curse he "went out from the presence of the Lord and dwelt in the land of Nod on the east of Eden."

"What hurts me especially," Mr. O went on to say, "is that all this was wished on me by the Conservative rabbis of the U. S. in convention assembled. It wouldn't have hurt me so much if the Orthodox rabbis had voted that I was just no good in their house. The Conservatives, you know, are supposed to be liberals."

Mr. O had a clipping in hand under a Cleveland dateline. It said: "The Jewish partner in mixed marriage will no longer be eligible for membership in Conservative congregations, the Law Committee of the Rabbinical Assembly of America announced in its report to the annual convention of Conservative rabbis here. Under the new ruling the Jewish man or woman who has married a non-Jew who has not been converted to Judaism cannot join a Conservative congregation." (The clipping was from the National Jewish Post.)

#### Man Unfit

"That seems to let me out as a man unfit to belong to Judaism," Mr. O said. "I am married to a Christian lady and I mean Christian. I myself through all these 15 years have remained a member of a Conservative Jewish congregation. Maybe I should be thankful because these rabbis voted that Jews like me who have been members of Conservative congregations for a long time shouldn't be kicked out of there to become exiles."

Mr. O reviewed the whole history of his married life. "She was a girl who worked in the same

office I did. A fine Christian lady, as I told you. I guess we were attracted to each other by our characters. Religious difference, if any, didn't come up at all until after we were married."

"I must resent the ruling of these Conservative rabbis because it is a reflection on my excellent wife. It suggests that I am not good enough to be a member of a Conservative congregation because of her."

"Only after we were married did we take up the matter of religion. One Sunday morning she said to me, 'I'm going to church. Do you care to come along?' There was no insistence in it, no suggestion that I must go along. I respected my wife's religion enough to go with her to church that Sunday."

#### Glad To Go

"It was not long before Rosh Hashonah and when that day came, I said to her, 'Do you care to come along with me to the synagogue?' Fine Christian lady that she is, she immediately said she would be glad to. In the Rosh Hashonah service she found much for the comfort of her own soul. Though religiously we were apart, you might say, her experience in the synagogue that day brought us even closer together."

"She came to understand better our essential unity under one God. She could remain Christian and I Jew and still we could be one. That's the way it has been religiously between us through all our years. She doesn't go to church every Sunday but on those Sundays when she attends, I go along. On our holidays she goes to the synagogue with me."

Mr. O said he felt fortunate that he was married to the lady long before the Conservative rabbis pronounced a decree of excommunication on intermarried Jews whose mates don't take conversion.

"Suppose we were married in the present time. Under the circumstances of my wife remaining Christian, I would have been barred from membership in the Conservative synagogue. 'A fugitive and a vagabond' as Genesis says about Cain, a fugitive and a vagabond from the house of Israel."

#### Have Good Laugh

"Would that have been good? Would the rabbis have made me more Jewish by doing that to me? Would it have contributed to our marital happiness? Would it have been helpful to our happiness that

### The Yiddish Mark Twain

## Genius of Sholom Aleichem Reflected In 'Wandering Star'

One of the greatest humorists of all time wrote in Yiddish. Many of his works have remained hidden from Jews unacquainted with Yiddish and, naturally, from non-Jewish readers.

The work of an able translator now makes available, in an English text, for the first time, a full length novel by Sholom Rabinowitch, who has become world famous as Sholom Aleichem.

When Sholom Aleichem came to this country in 1911, he was introduced to Mark Twain as "the Yiddish Mark Twain," and the great American humorist protested: "Oh, no," he said, "I am the American Sholom Aleichem."

Thus, Sholom Aleichem became known on a par with Mark Twain—and the latter, knowing the genius of the Yiddishist, endorsed the appellation.

Sholom Aleichem's work was evaluated in a fascinating book, "The World of Sholom Aleichem," by Maurice Samuel. Another admirer, the late Julius Butwin, commenced the translation of his short stories which was completed after his death by his widow, Frances Butwin. That book, "The Old Country," gained favor. Mrs. Butwin continued her translation of Sholom Aleichem with a second volume, "Tevye's Daughters." Now comes her third volume, the full length Sholom Aleichem novel, "Wandering Star," which has just been released by Crown Publishers (419 4th Ave., N. Y. 16).

"Wandering Star" deals with the theater. It is the story of two youngsters who fled their homes in Holenshtil, after being lured by impresarios who came to their little town to open up the vistas of the stage to a bewildered community. Both rose to great heights. Scheming directors separated them for selfish motives: the boy Leibel Rapaplovich, who became Leo Rapaleco, by Hotzmach, who became Holtzman the producer; and the girl, Reizel, who gained fame as the prima donna Rose Spivak. Hotzmach induced Leibel to steal the money from his rich father's cash box. Rosa was prized by her companions because of her voice. Rosa later returned to compensate her parents with the bounty of her income. Leibel never returned to Holenshtil. The two were reunited after they had traveled through all European countries, where they captured the hearts of their audiences, and landed in New York. They married and the story ends happily.

The tale captures the hearts of the readers because of its illuminating descriptions of the Yiddish theater in Holenshtil, later in

I had been made an outcast from the house of Israel? And what of the insult to my wife implied in the fact that on account of her I was not a fit man to belong to a Jewish congregation?"

Mr. O feared that at times rabbis take on the airs of being popes. "And to think of Conservative rabbis behaving that way! They are supposed to be enlightened minds. When I showed this clipping to my wife we had a good laugh together. We—she as Christian and I as Jew—had found a happy way to compose religious differences, far beyond the narrow path of ecclesiastics."

"I know what's on your mind, Mr. Segal. You want to ask me suppose we had children and what we would do about them religiously. My wife and I have discussed that. We can't have children but we know what we'd do if we had them. The much talked Judeo-Christian tradition would become real in our family."

"Our children would share both in their Jewish and Christian observances. We would observe in our house the Jewish religious practices, such as Seder and Chanuka and our children also would be taught to understand the higher spiritual meanings of Christmas and Easter. Thus, maybe, we could give the world some ideal people who understand the essential unity that is of all religions."

Romania, in England and then in the United States. It is a realistic story and it presents the typical charming views of Jewish life in the old world by the great humorist. The translator has succeeded in capturing the humorous twists of the Yiddish and to transform them into hilarious English. She has achieved the unpredictable in this novel.

Remember how people struggled to translate "haken a tchainik?" Mrs. Butwin catches the spirit of Sholom Aleichem in this translated paragraph:

"He knocks a teakettle" is an expression which didn't spring from our own soil. We borrowed it from America. "To knock a teakettle" doesn't mean, God forbid, to slander anyone. He who "knocks a teakettle" merely babbles or rants; his ears do not hear what his tongue is saying. Where does this expression come from? Why a kettle and not a samovar? And how does one knock this teakettle? We leave these profound questions to the savants of philology and anthropology. They might find their source in such phrases as "sounding brass and tinkling cymbal," or "a tale told by an idiot full of sound and fury," or in the primitive beating of tom-toms. Let the scholars worry their heads. We will not presume to dabble in another's craft, take a livelihood away from its rightful practitioners. We'll stick to the teakettle."

Genuine humor must have its pathos, and "Wandering Star" possesses it in full measure. But it always is told with a twinkling eye, with a search for joy, with Messianic hope, without fear.

Thus, Sholom Aleichem was the master of situations not only in the shtetel, in the old world's tiny villages and hamlets, of pre-Hitler days, but also in America. The chapter in "Wandering Star" entitled "America!" describes the reactions of arriving Italians, Poles, Germans, Russians, Japanese—and of the Jew!

"America. Woe is me," wails an olive-skinned Jewess in a black wig, holding one child by the hand and another in her arms. Her face drained of all color, she stares into the distance, where the outlines of chimneys, then roofs, then many-windowed buildings begin to appear. She can barely see the city, and already her heart beats with fear and is filled with worries and premonitions. Who knows if they will admit her with her two infants? Who knows if she won't get the same reception as in Germany? Will her husband be there to meet her? Will she need a passport as at home? Who knows if her pillows and bedding haven't been stolen?

"Of all the passengers who arrived that day on the Atlantic, none pushed and shoved so frantically at the gangplanks, none were in such a state of feverish excitement, so harassed and worried, as our Jews. And this is easy to understand. For they came from a land which had treated them without mercy. To them America was a Messiah, land of promise and deliverance. Meanwhile they huddled together like sheep, their hearts pounding, their pulses racing."

### N. Y. Library Gets 2 Mahzor Manuscripts

Two manuscripts of the Mahzor, both unusually fine examples of medieval Hebrew illumination, have been presented to the New York Public Library by Louis M. Rabinowitz, New York businessman and member of the Library's Citizen Advisory Committee. The manuscripts date from the late 13th or early 14th centuries according to the research of Dr. Joshua Bloch, Chief of the Jewish Division.

Ralph A. Beals, director of the Library, described Mr. Rabinowitz as the "ideal donor, who appears at just the right moment to make possible what has seemed impossible."

Each of the two manuscripts in the current gift is an Italian compilation of Jewish liturgical texts employed in synagogue worship. Written on vellum and richly decorated with miniatures, ornamental headlines, and initials, these Mahzorim are considered the first Hebrew Manuscripts to be illustrated with drawings of the human form. "They disprove," Dr. Bloch explained, "the widespread notion that Jews were forbidden to engage in such illustration because of the prohibition in the Second Commandment against making any likeness of anything that is in the heavens above, the earth beneath or the waters under the earth."

The Mahzorim include classical Hebrew prayers, religious poems, and hymns. The earlier one is the more profusely illuminated, but the later set is an extraordinary fine specimen of Hebrew calligraphy, according to Dr. Bloch. This second set includes the text of the Haggadah, the Passover (Seder) festival service for the home (not for the synagogue).

Each Mahzor is in two volumes, one set large folio, the other quarto.

Mr. Rabinowitz's earlier gifts to the Library include the first edition of the Moreh Nebukim (Guide for the Perplexed) by Moses Maimonides, a volume considered rare even among Hebrew incunabula, and more than a score of other early Hebrew imprints.

To kibitz was to indulge in repartee of a special sort, to needle someone, tickle him in the ribs, pull his leg, gnaw at his vitals, sprinkle salt on his wounds, give him the kiss of death, and all with a sweet smile, with a flash of rapier-like wit, with whimsy and humor."

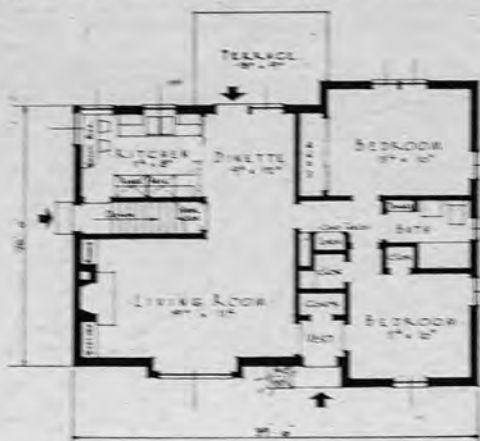
There is satire in "Wandering Star" on American Jewish practices. This one especially reveals the great wit's ability to observe and to sprinkle a salty kibitz:

"In America everyone, unless born a mute, makes speeches. They are made on every occasion—engagements, weddings, divorces, circumcisions, birthdays, Bar-Mitzvahs, anniversaries, housewarmings, funerals, the welcome of a guest and the departure of a pest. Whatever the occasion, merry or sad, it calls for speechmaking. And when it comes to a public occasion, then God Himself has bidden man to speak."

These are among the gems that are multiplied a thousandfold in "Wandering Star". It is a heart-warming book, and it brings back faith in a lingering hope that the great Yiddish literature and one of the greatest wits of all time, among all peoples—Sholom Aleichem—will not be forgotten.

## Britain Mild On Jerusalem Issue

## Find Radioactive Elements In Israel

JERUSALEM—Premier David Ben-Gurion last night announced the formation of an Atomic Energy Commission in Israel headed by Professor Hugo Bergmann, of the Weizmann Institute of Science. The announcement was followed up by an official communique revealing that "certain quantities of radioactive elements" have been discovered on Israel's soil. "The problem of supply energy is one of the basic problems of Israel's economy," the communique said. "In view of the fact that Israel's natural resources have shown that there are certain quantities of radioactive elements in Israel's soil, it has become necessary that Israeli scientists should conduct research into this new physical element."

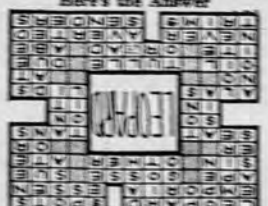

### Summer Swells The Town

The sightseeing tour continued where large estates of summer colonists line both sides of the highway. It soon became easy to understand how Narragansett swells to a population of 20,000, in the summer time, compare to 2,000 inhabitants whose main economy is commercial fishing during the quiet winter. Tourists from all over the country fill the beautiful mansions, its exclusive Dunes Club, cottages, tourists homes, and bring rushing business to souvenir shops, soda and hot dog stands, rocking the salty little town with vibrant seaside holiday. Add one quarter or more Rhode Island bathers during the week ends, and here lies one of the wealthiest towns in the state.

Almost hidden from Ocean Road by trees we nearly missed seeing one of the most famous landmarks in Narragansett. The top of a 108 feet high stone tower attracted our attention to "The Castle," built in 1842. It was recently converted into a "Retreat House" for men of Catholic Faith. A very pleasant attendant, well versed in the history of the famous landmark informed that the original owner was Joseph Peace Hazard. The 40-year old bachelor built his home at Seaside Farm. In the 80's, he decided to build the 180-foot tower. The tower itself became known as "Hazard's Folly." In it he installed many riches, set off by screen doors in which Hazard was said to have placed food daily for the spirits he believed lived with him. Our kind informant at the Castle, now the Retreat House remarked that, "Old Hazard would turn-over in his grave if he knew that his place

is now being used for a more spiritual advantage."

### Surfcaster's Paradise

For the short time we devoted to fishing, we soon discovered that it bits. Surf-casting off the rolling cliffs of the bay brought to surface several good size bass in rapid order. Summer evenings hundreds of fishermen line the rocks opposite the Casino in the Town Square, where at high tide they cast from the sidewalks and for about five miles along the rocks all the way to Point Judith.

At Point Judith, southern tip to the twin fishing villages of Galilee and Jerusalem, the fleet of commercial fishing boats and its rugged native fishermen—gives a realistic picture of a fish market village. ## Narragansett Seashore Is Popular Playground

**B**Y geography, nature, and history, Narragansett with its 30 miles of rocky shore line and sandy beaches, is one of the most popular playgrounds on the Atlantic coastline.

From Narragansett's northern boundary at Bonnet Shores to Point Judith at its southern tip, there are nine beaches, public and private for sun and surf bathing. Sailing, fishing, golf, tennis, bowling, riding, dancing, fresh sea food, resort hotels with their broad verandas and cupolas, adds to make Narragansett one of the best seaside liberty areas in the country.

### Crowded 8-hour tour

The visiting party discovered that in the space of eight hours it's next to impossible to actively participate in all the amusements available at Narragansett. However, an attempt is made here to give an exact picture of our recent itinerary around the Narragansett seashore.

Taking scenic route 1A, a liberty party consisting of three Waves, three sailors, and a Chief Aviation Pilot, left the Station last week at 10:00 A. M. when the mercury was already sweltering to a good 90 degrees. After a picturesque 18-mile drive from Quonset, following a long narrow strip of land with a very irregular coast line, the anxious party arrived at the Towers. This was originally the home of the old Narragansett Casino.

At the semi-private Canonchett Club, in the heart of the summer colony, our Navy members of the "goodwill" tour were treated to excellent beach facilities. The next hour was spent forgetting the inland heat waves while enjoying surf bathing and cool sea breezes.

### Looking For the Pier?

Shortly after 11:20 the refreshed party, fanned by the breeze of the bay, strolled along Ocean Drive, past Rockingham Hotel and to the well known Casino. "But what about the Pier?" a Wave asked. Out of nowhere an oldtimer shot out the terse statement, "Narragansett has no Pier!" That's when they decided to get "checked out" on Narragansett. The sun-baked gentleman informed them in September many years ago a long pier jutted out into the water just below the largest bathing beach. Here vessels of all descriptions

## SYD COHEN:

Jewish Hall of Famers



Sitting on a foot locker in an Army barracks in the northern reaches of New York State may not be the best atmosphere for the creation of a sports column. Yet, that is the origin of this essay, and it may be just as well. This short break in the annual two week encampment forces attention on a review of the week's activities, which otherwise might go unnoticed.

As the troop train left Providence almost two weeks ago, the daily papers were mentioning that two more names had been entered formally in baseball's Hall of Fame. The idea stuck until it came time to compose this column, and then it jumped to the front, and the thought came—what would be the makeup of a Jewish baseball Hall of Fame?

Well, I've conducted no complete survey on all the Jewish ball players of all time. That would require considerable research, for while the number of outstanding players has been fairly small, there have been innumerable Jewish players who made the big time, even if only briefly. So we'll stick to an All-Jewish team.

My inseparable companion, the Baseball Encyclopedia, at my side, and the names of several players in mind, an all-Jewish big league team gradually starts to shape up in mind, even though it is no pretense at being the last word in such aggregations. No doubt other names should be added. But these certainly will do until better names can be mentioned.

Here is a team, by positions, that would most certainly be respected, if not exactly all-powerful. It contains, behind the bat, such luminaries as Johnny Kling of the old Chicago Cubs, and

Harry "The Horse" Danning of the New York Giants. Modern fans may say, what about Joe Ginsberg of the Tigers? But Joe is not yet of the proven caliber of Kling and Danning; nor was the scholarly Moe Berg, who held almost as many degrees and spoke as many languages as he had base hits.

Kling definitely is the strong point here. His name is frequently mentioned with the top five catchers of all time—and that, brother, is indeed a rare tribute.

At first base, too, there is no argument and no need for apology. Two words—Hank Greenberg—tell the story. Again, one of the better men of all time.

Second base permits a wider selection but only one outstanding man—Buddy Myer of the Washington Senators. Some of the younger fans may not have heard of Myer. Buddy was a solid performer for a long time, and he held his own very nicely in competition with the likes of Charley Gehringer and the late Tony Lazzeri. The names of Louis "Boze" Berzer and Alan Richter might be mentioned, but not in Myer's league.

Moving over to third base, we find no argument with the choice of the modern fans. Al Rosen of the contending Indians stands out like a beacon, although his career has not yet reached its peak. Sid Gordon may get a lot of attention, and if he is chosen as a third baseman, then he deserves first call over Rosen. But Sid, like Greenberg, was adaptable. He became a proficient outfielder, and is still holding up his end with the Braves, even though he is near the end of his career. Let's say Sid for the pastures.

A weakness in this hypothetical team occurs where it hurts the most—at shortstop. I can recall no really good Jewish shortstop at that position. In an emergency, we could use Alan Richter, or the unknown Samuel Arthur Bohne (real name Cohen), who played second, third and short for the Reds and Dodgers for eight years in the 1920's. Boze Berzer is another candidate. He played that position during five American League seasons. But there isn't one outstanding shortstop to be named. Shading their eyes from the outfield sun are Sid Gordon, Cal

Abrams, Goody Rosen, Morris Aronovitch and Hank Greenberg, the latter included only provided you find another first baseman, which we haven't done. More about these men in a moment.

On the pitchers' rubber we have an incomplete list that starts with Saul Rogovin, Lou Kretlow and Billy Pierce of the White Sox of today, the inimitable Al Schacht, who peddled himself to the Washington Senators more than 30 years ago, and a fellow named Sammy Camnitz, who won 133 games for Pittsburgh at the start of the century.

There were other Jewish pitchers, of course. These names will have to suffice until a complete survey has been made. Said survey is under way. I hope to present it by the end of the summer.

The quality of the first three pitchers named is substantiated by their records of the past two years, when they helped keep the undermanned White Sox in the American League pennant race. Even this year, falling inevitably behind the leaders, Chicago is dying hard and still causing trouble. And Kretlow's two recent sensational two-hit shutouts over the Red Sox and Yankees have pointed the way.

Back to the catchers for a bit of biography. About Kling: Johnny's real name was Kline. He played with the Cubs from 1900 to 1912, when Chicago was a power. He was called the "Matchless Kline," the best receiver in a powerful league. He drew raves from sportswriters like Grantland Rice and from managers and players—and was a dependable hitter.

HANK GREENBERG: Hank was one of the American League's best hitters in an era of great hitters. He shares with Jimmy Foss the distinction of hitting the most homers among right hand hitters—58; and he missed by only one the RBI record of 184 still held by Lou Gehrig. With Hank in the lineup the Tigers were great, winning four pennants and two world titles. Without him they were just another club. He was a solid 300 hitter in each of his first nine full seasons. Greenberg voluntarily made himself an outfielder to enable his team to make use of the bat of Rudy York, and he became a voo-goo one.

With Pittsburgh in the final year of his career, Hank was so helpful to Ralph Kiner that Kiner asked him to serve as best man at his wedding.

HARRY DANNING: Hank caught for the Giants for ten years, four times hitting 300. He was Carl Hubbell's favorite receiver, and was rated with Gabby Hartnett at the head of the league's catchers.

BUDDY MYER: Charles Solomon Myer came up in 1925, stayed until 1941. A lone time. He hit 300 or better nine times, and was in the 290's on three other occasions. He even won an American League batting title. And he was a beast on defense. One of Washington's all-time greats.

Al Rosen and Sid Gordon need no profiling here. They are in the news every day.

MORRIS ARONOVITCH: A National League outfielder for eight years, Aronovitch's chief claim to fame is the batting championship he won with the Phillies in the '30's.

GOODY ROSEN: Goody was a fast, aggressive and crowd-pleasing outfielder with the Dodgers between 1937-46. He hit 300 with them three times. In his final year, with the Giants in 1946, he batted a respectable .281.

### Japan To Open Legation In Israel
