## World Opinion Divided On Who Is Aggressor

National and world opinion was sharply divided late this week on the issue of who is the aggressor in the Middle East fighting.

Despite the obvious fact that Israel invaded Egyptian soil, many veteran observers and government officials were inclined to place the blame at the door of the Egyptians, who have been strangling the Israelis economically and with telling effect in recent months.

In this wise, Israel's attack was termed a matter of self-defense, since the Jewish state had to free itself from the double threat of military invasion, which has been the repeated boast of Egypt's

Nasser, and the economic blockade, which in recent weeks had been extended by the Egyptians to a point within a mile and a half of the Israeli port of Eilat. This blockade, it was pointed out, cut off all shipments to and from the East.

These observers noted further that with its seizure of the Suez Canal, Egypt was now in a position to cut off shipments destined for Israel, even if such cargoes were being carried in neutral shipping. The recent massing of Arab forces posed an additional, and even graver problem.

### 3 Seek to Enlist In Israeli Army

The Israeli Army might well have set up a branch recruiting office at the Herald this week, in view of events that followed shortly after the invasion of Egypt.

Three young men appeared at this newspaper's offices, and announced that they wished to volunteer for service with Israel's forces. They sought information on how to do it.

The Herald suggested that they contact the Israel Embassy in Washington.

The three men, it should be noted, arrived separately, and apparently there was no connection among them.

Two of the volunteers were non-Jews.

## Former Israel Army Captain is Charged as Spy

TEL AVIV — Alexander Yulin, 44-year old former captain in the Israel Army, was charged this week with espionage for Egypt. Mr. Yulin, born in the Soviet Union and a veteran of Israel's War of Liberation, pleaded not guilty in Tel Aviv's District Court.

The prosecution claims that Mr. Yulin, who was discharged from the Israel Army last year, after an unsuccessful attempt at farming complicated by family difficulties, left Israel as a correspondent for a local newspaper. A former Red Army officer, Mr. Yulin

was supposed to be returning to the USSR.

However, in Switzerland, Mr. Yulin became involved in currency difficulties, was arrested and expelled from the country. According to the prosecutor, he went to Vienna where he approached the Soviet Embassy and was asked to give information on "Jewish institutions." From there he went to Germany where an approach to American intelligence was rejected.

Finally in Paris, Mr. Yulin allegedly made contact with an

Egyptian Embassy military attache whom he convinced that he had information of value about the Israeli Army. The prosecution charges that Mr. Yulin was taken by the Egyptians first to Athens, then to Cairo where he met with intelligence officers and directors of the Hebrew section of Radio Cairo.

After a few weeks he was flown back to Athens and then made his way to Israel. Here he is said to have approached Israel intelligence officers and offered his services. He was arrested.

## Reform Head Blasts Israeli Orthodoxy

NEW YORK—Leaders of American Reform Judaism from all parts of the country held a four-day emergency conference here opening in the weekend to formulate a program of action designed to alleviate the serious shortage of rabbis and religious school personnel and to aid communities in organizing and establishing new congregations. More than 300 delegates representing 534 Reform congregations are attending the parley.

In opening the conference, Dr. Maurice N. Elensdrath, president of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, denounced "intolerant elements" in the State of Israel which have opposed the introduction of Reform Jewish practices. "We must cease this conspiracy of silence, this shasha policy of shunning the blasphemous boycott and battle of our Orthodox brethren against the breadth of freedom of religion—that is to say of the Jewish religion, because, as we all know, most paradoxically, Christian and Moslem enjoy greater religious liberty than do some of our fellow Jews—upon the soil of Israel."

## Rabbi Goldman to Speak At Beth Israel Celebration

Rabbi Israel M. Goldman of Baltimore, formerly of Temple Emanuel in Providence, will be the principal speaker at the 35th anniversary celebration of Temple Beth Israel to be held Sunday, Nov. 11 at the Sheraton-Biltmore Hotel.

The event will also be in honor of the 35th anniversary of the ordination of Rabbi Morris Schusheim, D.D., who served most of those years as spiritual leader of Beth Israel, the first Conservative Congregation in Rhode Island.

Several hundred persons are expected to attend the dual observance which will open with a reception in the ballroom foyer at 5:30 and dinner in the ballroom at 6:30 P. M.

Speakers will include Governor Dennis J. Roberts, Mayor Walter H. Reynolds of Providence, Marshall B. Marcus, president of the Congregation, and Henry Hassenfeld, who will represent the Jewish community. Ira S. Galkin will be toastmaster, with Coleman B. Zimmerman as general chairman.

Rabbi Goldman came to Providence in 1925 while still a student at the Jewish Theological Seminary in New York to help found Temple Emanuel. He remained as its spiritual leader for 23 years.

## Khrushchev Blames Pole Revolt On "Influence" of Zionists

LONDON — Nikita S. Khrushchev, leader of the Communist party in the Soviet Union, injected an anti-Semitic note into his angry talks with Wladyslaw Gomulka, former purged Polish leader who now has been restored to favor in the Polish Communist ranks and who successfully challenged Moscow's domination over Poland.

The rift between Khrushchev and Gomulka led to clashes between Polish and Soviet troops and the ousting of Moscow influence in Poland in a "Tito-like" revolt.

A correspondent of the British Broadcasting Corporation reported from Warsaw that when Khrushchev arrived there together with other top Soviet leaders he told Gomulka: "Russian blood has been spilled for the liberation of Poland, and now you want to turn the country over to Americans and to the Zionists."

The Soviet leaders, including Khrushchev, flew back to Moscow after stormy conferences with

members of the Polish Politburo, which successfully supported Gomulka's stand after Poland, in turn, accepted the retention of Soviet Marshal Konstantin Rokossovsky, Red Army Stalingrad hero, in the role of Polish army commander as the price paid to Moscow for the newly-won Polish "freedom." Earlier, the pro-Soviet Rokossovsky had been purged along with other Russian leaders.

The Warsaw Jewish newspaper "Folkstimm", which reached here earlier in the week, reports that the Politburo, at the historic meeting at which basic changes were made in its composition, was scheduled to discuss a resolution urging "an energetic ideological fight against anti-Semitism" and suggesting severe punishment of those who are "insulting people because of their racial or national origin." The resolution was introduced by representatives of the Wroclaw regional committee of the United Workers party, the Communist party of Poland.

## GJC Total Reaches \$442,000; M-Day Results Please Leaders

M-Day of the 1956 campaign was one of the most successful one-day-drive for funds ever conducted in the history of the General Jewish Committee.

Spurred on by the critical conditions in the seething Middle East, volunteer workers covered close to 1,400 cards in last Sunday's house-to-house canvas for funds for the Women's Division of the GJC.

A total of \$6,000, representing an increase of 30 percent over last year's M-Day, was contributed or pledged, Mrs. Irving L. Solomon, M-Day chairman, reported.

"The results of the M-Day drive are wonderful and I wish to thank all the workers for the excellent job and also the people of Providence who contributed so generously in this critical period," Mrs. Solomon declared. "This has resulted in a substantial overall increase over last year's total figure and, when the final figures are in, I am sure we will have considerably surpassed last year's mark," she added.

Meanwhile, Benjamin Brier, general campaign chairman, announced that the total fund-drive figure now stands at \$442,000—a

substantial increase over last year's total at a similar period in the campaign. Brier said that this figure is expected to be considerably increased after the results of last Wednesday's reports are completed.

"We are running well ahead of last year, but we must continue our intensive drive," Brier said. "Due to the latest developments in the Middle East, we must all increase our efforts. Today, more than ever, Israel needs our help and we must give them all the possible assistance."

## Jews in Protest Against Burial

GENOA—The Jewish community of Genoa has addressed a strong protest to the municipal authorities against the burial of a Jew in the Catholic cemetery.

The Jew, who was en route from the United States to Israel, was removed from a vessel after suffering a severe fall. While he was in the hospital he was visited by members of the Jewish community to whom he repeatedly professed his Jewish faith.

On the morning after his death, Jewish community members who went to the hospital were told that in his last moments he had asked to become a Catholic and had received the sacraments. His family in Israel had been informed of his death, but no mention has been made of his alleged conversion. The community here has demanded that the body be sent to Israel for burial by the family.

Stressing the urgency of the 1956 campaign of the General Jewish Committee due to new developments in the Middle East area, Benjamin Brier, general campaign chairman, today announced that another report luncheon will be held next Wednesday noon, November 7, at the Narragansett Hotel.

"Israel today faces the most critical time in her brief history," Brier asserted. "I urge every Jewish member of the Greater Providence area to keep this fact in mind and continue to stand by Israel."

## The Jewish Teacher

The Jewish teacher is the lifeline of the American Jewish community. Through him the Jewish people hope to communicate to their children their traditions and visions for the future. And, yet, despite the critical importance of the Jewish teacher to the future of American Jewry, the manpower crisis in Jewish education is the most serious it has ever been.

This is a problem that will not be solved by individual communities and agencies, but only through a national concerted attack on all manifestations of the problem.

It therefore makes good sense that the American Association for Jewish Education, the national coordinating agency for Jewish education in the United States, has undertaken to call a national conference on the manpower crisis in Jewish education. This conference which is being co-sponsored by numerous important national agencies, is meeting at this time in Washington, D. C., at the Hotel Willard.

We are happy that our community through the Bureau of Jewish Education is being represented at this historic conference, the first of its kind devoted solely to the issue of Jewish educational personnel. We should not be content with mere attendance at the conference; we should rather look to adopting sound effective measures that will go far toward meeting this crisis.

Our community, together with all other mature and responsible Jewish communities in the land, will want to play its role in implementing concrete proposals.

Let us do our best to measure up to the magnitude and sacredness of this obligation—an obligation which touches on the future of our children and their children after them.

## Voting for School Committee

In the heat of a partisan political campaign, elections to the School Committee often are inclined to be lost in the shuffle. This is unfortunate, of course, for the personalities and the issues involved in the School Committee elections are of no lesser importance than those of the partisan political arenas.

Even the ballot may seem at times to be "against" the School Committee candidates. The voter has to be careful lest he overlook them, for their names appear well down on the ballot. But there is an even greater danger. The lever to the right of the name of the School Committee candidate is not connected to the master lever that registers a "straight" party ticket, even though the names appear in these party columns.

In other words, the voter must pull the lever beside the name of the School Committee candidate he desires to elect, otherwise he has not voted for him at all. Many voters in the past have left the booth thinking they have voted for School Committee, when in fact they did not.

It is this fact that must be kept in mind and that bears repeating. The master levers don't count in the School Committee election. You must pull the individual lever.

## The Riddle of the Merchants Club

(This is the second in a two-part series on The Merchants Club of New York, an association of prominent men in the cotton-textile industry. In its 85 years of existence, the Club has never admitted a member of the Jewish faith, claiming that the Club is a social organization whose members have a right to group themselves on the basis of common religious beliefs. The contradiction in this statement of policy has been brought to light in suits against the U. S. Internal Revenue Bureau. The Club has been trying to recover taxes levied against the group on members' dues on the ground that it is not a social club.)

### PART II

The Anti-Defamation League has tried to unravel the contradiction. On May 14, 1956, the League wrote to Malcolm S. Black, president of the Merchants Club:

"In all candor, we must tell you that we have been receiving questions from many individuals, both inside and outside the cotton textile industry, who, for reasons of their own, desire an

evaluation by the Anti-Defamation League of whether the Merchants Club bars Jews from membership and the use of its facilities. We are under an obligation to answer these queries, and under an equal obligation not to do The Merchants Club any injustice.

"Obviously, if The Merchants Club is a social club whose basis for existence is religious homogeneity, the propriety of its membership policies must be considered within the context of rights of social privacy.

"We feel that an intelligent approach to this complex problem requires a personal meeting with you and any other officers of The Merchants Club concerned with this matter. Hopefully, such a discussion, undertaken in a spirit of honest and frank exploration, may prevent misunderstanding.

"If this suggestion is acceptable, we will be happy to meet with you and your colleagues at any time and place suitable to you."

There was no answer. Still seeking clarification, the League wrote to President Black on June 5th again proposing a



## ONE MAN'S OPINION

### The Small Lever at the Bottom of the Ballot

Amidst the clash and thunder of the presidential elections and the partisan rivalries of the national and state office seekers, we might lose sight of a so-called minor election for which we are to vote this coming November 6.

And it would be a pity if we were to neglect the issues involved in this minor election or to overlook its importance. Though it is of a local nature and it is conducted quietly and unobtrusively, the outcome of this election is as close to us as are the best interest of our children.

On November 6, when we elect the President and Vice-President of the United States, and federal and state legislators of all kinds, we will also elect members of the Providence School Committee.

Alongside the big issues and the important decisions involved in the general election, the School Committee of the City of Providence might look insignificant. But when all the election season excitement is over, this school committee will meet month after month to deliberate problems and to make decisions that touch us very intimately. They are the problems of our own city and of our own neighborhood where we live and bring up our children.

And there is good reason to fear that the school committee elections might be treated lightly come election day.

For one thing the school committee members are elected on a non-partisan basis. There are no Democratic or Republican candidates for the school committee. The candidates for this office are entirely independent of party. They are neither endorsed nor promoted by either political party. Their only qualification is an intense interest in education in general and in the local schools in particular.

This is as it should be. But then the candidates for the school committee do not benefit by the band wagon campaign of the party-endorsed candidates for other offices. Their names do not appear in big letters on the campaign posters, and their pictures do not adorn the billboards and the show cards. Their voices are not heard on radio and television. They have no financial backing. Their only asset is an appeal to the intelligence of voters who have the interest of their school

meeting. Still no response.

The riddle remains unsolved. Enconced in their comfortable quarters at 26 Thomas Street, in the heart of New York's textile district, the members of the Merchants Club are either a social group or a business organization—not both. For the purposes of its relationship with the United States Internal Revenue Bureau, the Merchants Club is a non-social organization. To the community—particularly to the cotton textile industry—it stands as a symbol of social snobbery that falls far short of twentieth century ethics.

system at heart.

When the voters enter the election booth to cast a ballot for the candidates of their choice, they must remember to vote for the School Committee as well. Failing to do so will void thousands of votes.

And there is great danger that this might happen.

### Confusing System

For some reason the names of the candidates for the School Committee are placed underneath the first column on the ballot sheet. This column, the upper part of it, is the space given to the candidates for offices on the Democratic ticket. That is most unfortunate. Republican voters might mistake the school committee for candidates on the opposition ticket and not pay attention to them at all. Democrats may have the impression that by pulling their party lever on the top of the column they have voted for everybody including the School Committee.

I realize that what I just tried to explain might be vague. But when you consult a copy of the ballot sheet and examine the plan you will understand why it is possible to have a great loss of votes for the school committee, through misunderstanding the arrangement of the ballot.

If your vote for the school committee is to count, you must pull the small lever at the bottom of the column, separately and distinctly. The School Committee is not a party slate, and is not included in a straight vote for the ticket of any party. It is a party unto itself.

Now, why is the School Committee so important even in this year of world shaking issues?

Let me repeat: When the smoke of the national elections subsides, and the winners celebrate their victory, and the losers retreat to lick their wounds, we will remain here in Providence, and will have to wrestle with our own local problems. No national election will solve them for us.

Topping the list of our local problems is the school system.

### Some Of The Problems

And here are some of the problems facing our school system, as I gathered from a conversation with Sherwin J. Kapstein, who has been serving capably and actively on the School Committee for ten years and is a candidate for re-election this November.

1. **Oversized classes.** In spite of recent advances in the understanding of the process of education, and in spite of the generally accepted truth that large classes are detrimental to good education, our teachers still have to face classes of 30 and more pupils. This situation must be remedied.

2. **The remedy,** and the only remedy, is more teachers. More good teachers. To attract good teachers to our schools and to keep them, we must make their conditions of work attractive and their remuneration decent.

Both of these, attractive conditions of work and sufficient

pay, leave much to be desired in our school system.

We are told that many of our schools are unfit for the activities carried on in them, and are badly in need of modernization. Many are too old. The Benefit Street Public School, for instance, is over 100 years old. Many buildings were declared as unfit for schools as early as in a survey of 1925. They are still in use today. Many schools have no hot running water, no cafeteria facilities, no modern heating, no teachers' staff room, and are in need of a change-over from their antiquated lighting and plumbing systems.

We are told that the city is not getting all the use it can make of its junior and senior high school buildings. These can be made available to civic groups, veterans' posts, Y-centers, and Scout clubs for after school programs. At a time when we are all concerned about juvenile delinquency and wholesome activities for our youth, it seems a waste of good facilities to keep the high schools darkened and locked in the evening when they could be used to the convenience of the neighborhood.

These and many other issues are involved in the elections to the School Committee, as I gathered from my talk with Mr. Kapstein and from reading of some minutes published by the City of Providence School Committee.

To solve the problems facing our school system, the committee needs men and women who:

1. Understand these problems.
2. Feel strongly about them to urge remedies.
3. Are capable and experienced in the workings of a School Committee.

It is our duty, therefore, to be careful that our vote for the School Committee is not lost in the shuffle of the National and State elections.

We must pull that small lever next to the name of the candidate for the School Committee, and leave it at X before we draw the curtain in the voting booths.

## Recipes For Jewish Cuisine

### Pot Roast DeLuxe

- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon ginger
- 4 or 5-lb. pot roast
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 3 onions, sliced
- 1/4 cup oil
- 1/2 cup water
- 1/2 cup dried mushrooms
- 1 1/2 cups prunes
- 1 1/2 cups warm water
- 1 cup ripe olives

Mix salt, pepper and ginger. Rub into meat. Sauté garlic and onion in oil until tender. Add meat, and brown on all sides. Add 1/2 cup water, cover kettle tightly and cook over low flame for 1 1/2 hours. Turn meat frequently. While it is cooking, soak mushrooms and prunes in 1 1/2 cups warm water. When the meat has cooked 1 1/2 hours, add the mushrooms, prunes and water, together with olives. Cover and cook about 2 hours longer. Place meat on plate, surrounded by prunes, mushrooms and olives. Skim off excess fat, add a tablespoon or two of boiling water to the pan drippings, stir and serve with the meat as gravy. Serves 8.

### Queen Fritters From Israel

- 1 cup water
- 1/4 cup butter or substitute
- 1 cup sifted flour
- 3 eggs
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- Deep fat for frying
- Preserves or jam
- Confectioners' sugar

Place water and butter in a saucepan. Bring liquid to boiling, and stir in the flour until the dough forms a mass in the center of the pan. Remove from heat and cool. Add eggs, one at a time, beating after each addition. Stir in salt. Form small balls the size of a walnut and drop into hot fat about 360 degrees, and fry until light brown. Drain on paper towels, and with a fork make a small opening on the top of each. Spoon some jam into the opening.

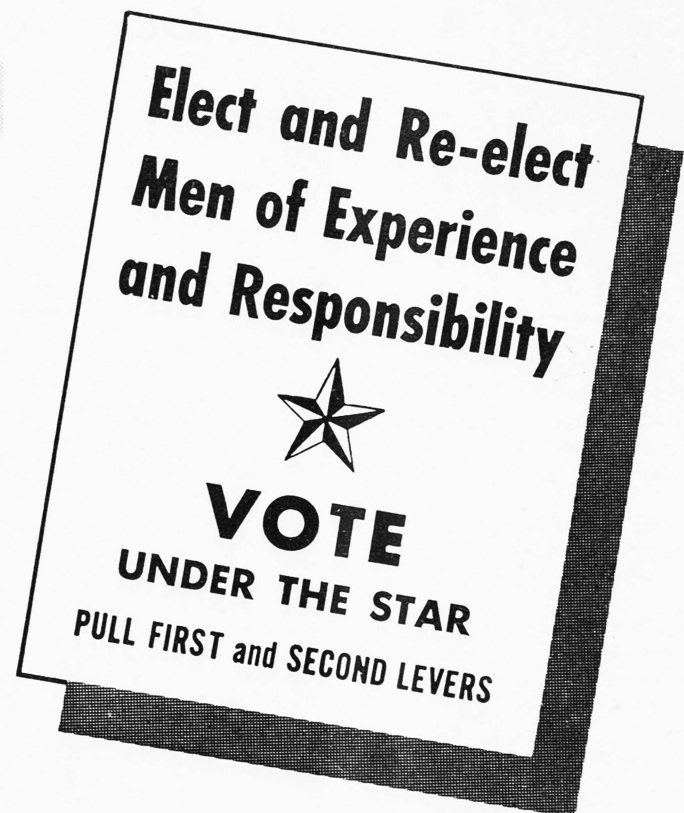

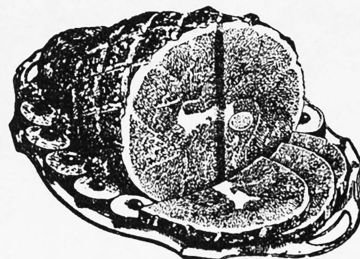

**Man of the Year?**

As one who reads the daily sports pages as eagerly as the next man, I realized this week that one particular name had been appearing in print pretty consistently of late, especially when you consider that football is basking in the spotlight now, with hockey slowly coming into its own.

That name is Hank Greenberg, and if you were seeking a Jewish man of the year in sports, you might be hard put to think of another personality who deserves being rated ahead of Hank in that category.

Hank is always in the news, and usually making it; whether it is to announce publicly that Al Rosen is through at Cleveland, or whether it is to dangle the Indians' managerial portfolio in front of the sensitive nose of the fussy Mr. Durocher; whether it is making a speech before some Cleveland fan club, or whether it is trying to drum up a "hate-the-Yankees" campaign among all American League clubs in general, and his own Indians in particular.

It is Greenberg, you know, who is plumping for a new kind of baseball schedule, that permits the playing of a limited number of inter-league games that would count in the standings; for example, the Red Sox and Dodgers in a home-and-home series, and the Yanks and Redlegs, etc. The idea hasn't taken hold yet, but Hank is still working on it.

The thing is that Greenberg is always working, and always thinking. To him baseball is

a 12-month-a-year job, and not a position that permits the taking of winter-long vacations.

Some genreal managers would be very happy with a record like Greenberg's. Hank's teams never have fallen lower than second place since he took over the reins of the Indians. They won one pennant—the only pennant that the hated Yankees have lost in years—and that is a distinction. Yet, Greenberg is unhappy. Second place is fine for the lower clubs to shoot at, but Hank wants to win all the marbles. He wants to win every year, the way that the Yankees do now, and he is deeply hurt when his club fails of that objective.

So now Hank is at it again, not willing to take a vacation when there is work to be done that might benefit the Indians; thinking all the time, even if some of his thinking does not set well with baseball's brass. Greenberg, who was formally inducted into the Hall of Fame at Cooperstown last summer, has a lot of irons in the fire—an awful lot for one man.

In the first place, he is negotiating with Durocher, and keeping close tabs on other potential managers in case Lippy won't play. In the second place, he has the second division teams of the American League soberly considering trade offers he is making involving some stars of the Cleveland lineup. To that extent, he is far ahead of some other clubs that are waiting for the winter meetings before going into the player marts. We shall not here draw odious comparisons with clubs that are near and dear to our hearts here in New England (Boy, is that subtle!).

Not content with that, Greenberg is pushing a proposal that the pennant winning team in the American League be barred from trading with any other club as long as it is champion. This, of course, is aimed at the annoying Yanks, and Hank knows he is fighting a losing cause. Yet, he will not give in, for he is devoting all his energies to defeating the Yankees and breaking up that New York monopoly.

The Indians' GM is the leading advocate of the hate-the-Yanks movement. And he is willing to expound his theory on this, too. Hank says he doesn't mean that literally, as some people believe. He likes the Yankee players and executives, gets along with them fine. But he wants his team, and every other American League team, to go out and get mad at

the Yanks and take it out on the New Yorkers on the field of play, where such a mad could result in more victories and point the way to a string of new league champions.

If enough clubs did it that way, Hank figures his boys might just be able to slide through to the pennant (s); for it is his Cleveland club about which Greenberg is most concerned.

So far Hank Greenberg stands alone on his proposals, has made no trades, has not yet settled on a manager, has few prospects of finishing higher than second next year. But he is trying awfully hard, and you have to admire him for his hustle, his persistence, his refusal to continue to accept defeat, his constant espousal of new ideas, whether good, bad or indifferent.

In my book, he is one of the top men in sports, this year or any year.

**The Softball Champs**

For several years—during most of the life of the Jewish Softball League, in fact—Lou Glaser has been sponsoring the Technoprint team and yearning for a championship. Until this year, the title always went elsewhere and Technoprint was just another also-ran.

Now—or rather, not so many Sundays ago—Glaser achieved at last the pinnacle for which he so patiently struggled, and his patience and sportsmanship paid off. Lou has the league champions.

Several times, when new sponsors were coming into the league, Glaser has unprotestingly permitted strong clubs to be assigned to
