## Party Upset Over Premier's Remarks

TEL AVIV—Disquiet provoked by Premier David Ben Gurion's sharp criticism of the Zionist movement had repercussions in the ranks of the Premier's own followers in the Mapai Party.

When the party's executive met, one of its members demanded a special meeting to consider what he described as Mr. Ben Gurion's disturbing attitude—a reference to the Premier's speech in which he lashed out at Zionists and said he himself was not a Zionist.

The demand was rejected after Giora Josephthal, secretary-general of the Mapai Party, told the meeting that a majority of the Mapai rank and file did not share Ben Gurion's views on Zionism and Mr. Ben Gurion was aware of that fact. The Premier's views were not recent, he pointed out, although their formulation had disturbed both Mapai members in Israel and Zionists elsewhere.

Mr. Josephthal pointed out that some of the concern had been caused by the unusual method Mr. Ben Gurion had used to express himself. Instead of affirming his own Zionism and attacking the others as not being Zionists, Mr. Ben Gurion had said that if the others were Zionists, he was not.

The furor arose over the debate over the role and status of Zionism, with the Premier holding the position that to be a Zionist meant to settle in Israel. Dr. Nahum Goldman, president of the World Zionist Organization, Moshe Sharett, former Premier, argued that there was a role and purpose for the Zionist movement outside of Israel.

## Jewish Civilians Suffer In Algeria

LONDON — "A few hundred" Jewish civilians in Algeria have been murdered by Arab terrorists since the outbreak of the nationalist rebellion in November, 1954, Maurice Carr, correspondent of London Jewish Chronicle, was informed by communal Jewish leaders in Algiers.

Precise casualty figures are not available because official communications make no distinction between Christians and Jews.

There are 130,000 Jews in this country, beside 1.1 million Christians and over eight million Moslems. In the villages, pogroms for the sake of plunder are perpetrated under the guise of Arab nationalism.

## Quits Nantucket Because Of Local Hostility To Jews

NANTUCKET, Mass. — A Preston Manchester said today he was getting out of this resort island after 22 years because of its "bigoted hostility to the Jews."

Manchester, descendant of an old New England family, said he was selling the New Ocean House and adjacent Upper Deck restaurant—the largest here. He said he was moving away and "never coming back."

"I'm fed up with Nantucket he said. "This is America. Why should we discriminate? I take all people as I find them and the Jews I know are damned nice people."

He said that Nantucket suffered a loss of tourist trade while other New England resorts were thriving, all because of its attitude toward Jews.

"We are way behind," Manchester said. "Fine Jewish people from New York and Boston bypassed us because they knew the town's attitude toward them."

Manchester and his wife, Margaret, came here from Taunton, Mass.

Their hotel and restaurant on the waterfront have an assessed valuation of \$200,000 but a much higher market value.

## Still for Nazism, Publisher Says

KARLSRUHE, Germany — A German publisher told the West German Supreme Court here today he is "still fighting" for the Nazi regime. Publisher Peter Lenz, 57, is charged with publishing and disseminating literature "glorifying Adolf Hitler and National Socialism, and abusing Jews."

Soon after the trial began, Lenz, a tall, well-dressed man, was accused by one of the Judges, Friedrich Jagusch, of trying to glorify nazism even now.

"Yes, I am still fighting for that regime," Lenz replied.

The indictment alleges that since 1954 Lenz had imported from Argentina about 1,000 copies of the book "Adolf Hitler—His Battle Against the Minus Soul."

It said the book attempts to justify Nazi persecution of Jews and to prepare the ground in West Germany for an authoritarian regime of Nazi character.

Lenz is also accused of having published himself about 10,000 copies of two similar books.

## Voice New Charges Of Anti-Semitism

BONN—Fresh charges of anti-Semitism have been leveled against Chancellor Konrad Adenauer by his opponents in the West German election campaign.

The leader of the Free Democrats, Wolfgang Doering, told a meeting of party chiefs yesterday:

"The primitiveness of the Christian Democratic (Adenauer's party) election campaign cannot be surpassed. It is based on the idea of frightening the people with Bolsheviks, Socialists, liberals, Jews and Free Masons, and then the people will fearfully conceal themselves behind the clerical skirts of the Christian Democrats Sept. 15."

The Socialists have also stepped up the volume of their protests against what they term "scandalous anti-Semitic excesses" directed at Erich Ollenhauer, their candidate for chancellor.

The Christian Democrats made a public "apology" to Ollenhauer two weeks ago, after a party official had falsely "accused" him of being Jewish.

## Expect Capacity Crowd To Attend Initial Gifts Dinner

The current tense situation in Syria is providing a dramatic background to the General Jewish Committee's 1957 campaign kickoff dinner on September 18, featuring the speaking appearance of Israeli Ambassador Abba Eban.

The Israel Ambassador left Israel for the United States a few days ago and is expected to discuss the latest Syrian and other Middle East developments with top State Department officials. Diplomats believe that the United States must take firm action if it wants to prevent the Soviet Union from consolidating its position in Syria and using it as a base for a new victorious round in the East-West struggle over the Middle East.

Present indications are that a capacity crowd will attend the dinner at the Sheraton-Biltmore Hotel ballroom and campaign

leaders are predicting that this will be one of the biggest events in the history of the GJC.

Joseph K. Levy, general campaign chairman, and Irving J. Fain, Initial Gifts chairman, urge everyone planning to attend to make their reservations immediately. They said to assure a reservation call the GJC headquarters in downtown Providence without delay. The telephone number is GASpee 1-4111.

"An exceedingly high interest is being manifested in the Eban dinner as the 1957 campaign swings into high gear and anyone planning to attend should act immediately," Mr. Fain declared.

The minimum gift for this dinner is \$100. The affair is sponsored by Men's Initial Gift division and due to the limited seating capacity the dinner is limited to men.

## Flow of Soviet Arms to Syria Alarming, Golda Meir Says

JERUSALEM — Israeli Foreign Minister Golda Meir says increasing amounts of Soviet arms are pouring into Syria and Russian technicians are coming with them.

At a luncheon the foreign Press Assn. in Israel gave in her honor last week, she said Israel is extremely anxious over the Soviet-Syrian developments.

"We are worried," she said, "because we know these arms are in the hands of neighbors whose declared policy is to destroy Israel."

A correspondent of Tass, the official Soviet news agency, asked Mrs. Meir what Israel intends to do to improve relations with the Soviet Union. Mrs. Meir, a former

ambassador to Moscow, replied:

"We are not clever enough to think of any new steps that possibly could be taken. We have tried everything possible in this direction. We are ready to repeat it. We are ready to listen to any new proposals and suggestions that might come up.

"It is Israel's declared policy to maintain friendship with all peoples and nations irrespective of their internal system.

"Nevertheless, it is obvious that relations tend to become better toward those states which allow Jews living in their midst to be in contact with Israel and enable the emigration of Jews to Israel for those who want to come here."

## Ben Albert Finds Israel Even More Wonderful Than Reported

 To Ben Albert who returned at the beginning of the week from his first trip to Israel, the country is even more wonderful than what he had expected.

"Israel is more thrilling than the many glowing reports I'd heard previously," he says. "In my most optimistic moment, I never dreamt that the Jews of 70 nations could be assembled together, work together and create a new world such as I saw. Tens of thousands of apartment houses, thousands of red-roofed clean cottages built by the United Jewish Appeal surrounded by green, green fields of everything from olives to corn. For years I had heard — the Jews would never work the land. How wrong our enemies were!"

Mr. Albert with his wife and his eighteen year old son, Billy, traveled through Europe and spent several days riding through Israel. Although tired from traveling and from the work of catching up with his business affairs after his trip, Mr. Albert was obviously quite impressed by his visit to Israel.

"Jews of all ages from 96 down, each did his share to earn his keep." He comments, "It took me some time to absorb the fact that the United Jewish Appeal played such an important part in building the houses and furnishing the agricultural equipment. We in the United States can take selfish pride that so many have contributed."

He asks, "Can you imagine cities like Haifa with about 300,000 people and Tel Aviv with 500,000 and Jerusalem with perhaps 1,000,000, where the population is practically 100% Jewish? There are Jews from Poland, Russia, Rumania, Yemen, Morocco and from the DP camps who are now walking erect with a

confident gleam in their eyes. They are as good as the next fellow. They have pride in being Israelis."

He says, "You are impressed by the tens of thousands of trees which have been planted in Israel within the last nine or ten years. And just about 1,000 feet away are the Arabian lands of Jordan which are still as barren as they have been for thousands of years."

"I stopped at a hotel on top of the hill in Haifa. Your heart is filled with awe and sometimes you have to pinch yourself to make sure you're not dreaming — in the thousands of apartments live Jews to whom the United Jewish Appeal gave homes originally."

These were Jews whose rehabilitation was accomplished by contributions to the United Jewish Appeal. They had been frightened refugees just a short while before.

"As the eye wanders around the periphery of the harbor, you can

easily see vast numbers of industrial plants in operation right to the Jordanian border. There is no fear in Israel. The children — and the streets are full of them — walk erect — their legs seem long and healthy. They are no different than yours or mine."

He spoke of Technion Institute, a beneficiary of the General Jewish Committee, which is being built a short distance from Jerusalem near the new government building center. 300 acres have been allocated for Israel's new M.I.T. Here the future engineers, scientists and technical men and women will be trained for the future of their country.

In Tel Aviv they were very happy to have dinner with Anne and David Meyers, who are now traveling in Israel and who will return to Providence within a short while. Mr. Albert says that they were as thrilled and excited with the country as the Alberts had been.

"Never in the history of man has so much been done by a free people like the citizens of these

United States through an agency such as the United Jewish Appeal to enable millions of other human beings an opportunity to live, to give their children an education and a home for future generations.

"You generous people are blessed thousands of times for your generosity by the newcomers of Israel. I know we will continue to give Israel and its people what they need through the General Jewish Committee."

Mr. Albert concluded "The Bible stated that the land will have 'milk and honey' and this conglomeration of displaced persons from 70 nations have made the deserts green — and truly a land of milk and honey."



## Giving Weapons to Enemies

Last week, the New York Times reported from Warsaw what may well be described as a king-sized oddity. It appears that a number of Polish newspapers have praised the anti-communist Radio Free Europe for its "realism" in broadcasting a warning that political refugees seeking asylum in the West face a number of hardships. These difficulties include the unavailability of visas for either the United States or Canada, the inability of escapees to obtain employment, the unpleasant conditions existing in "temporary" camps in West Germany, and the near-impossibility of obtaining the necessary documents to go elsewhere.

Radio Free Europe acknowledges having made such broadcasts, and notes that it was merely offering a factual comment on the hardships facing defectors. Escapees, it was emphasized, might have to spend as much as a year in camps waiting for the precious visas to take them to lands of freedom.

Polish praise for this broadcast, of course, is predicated on the well-founded belief that this should act as a powerful deterrent to would-be defectors. We must assume that the Soviet Union and its satellites will similarly exploit the fact that Congress, in the session which concluded last week, passed an immigration bill which failed to grant permanent status to 28,000 Hungarian refugees in the U. S. These parolees, in effect, remain "stateless" people, and will continue to face all the psychological hazards implicit in such a condition.

But this is just one of a number of serious deficiencies in this latest immigration measure, whose generosity is so stringently limited that relatively few persons will benefit. Regardless of defects, though, it does represent certain advances. Like the compromise civil rights bill, which is not fully satisfactory to either of the main camps which battled over its provisions, it offers some hope for the future. This hope, very likely, will be found in the way both of these measures will be interpreted.

Wisdom, we believe, demands that the most liberal and kindly use be made of this new immigration measure. With the historic civil rights bill — the first such law since Civil War Reconstruction days — firmness, but not necessarily rigidity, seems to be indicated.

We can be certain of two things. The first is that those Americans who believe good citizenship compels continued efforts in behalf of liberalized immigration laws and the extension of civil rights, will not stop working for exactly that. The second point is at least partly conditioned by the first, in that we know our country's reputation will take on more luster by such efforts. To do less will mean adding dangerous power to communist propaganda directed not only against us, but against their own nationals whose passionate longing for freedom is a source of fear to their despotic overlords.

Zambrowsky, national executive secretary of the Mizrahi Zionist Organization of America, to conduct the High Holy Days services.

## ONE MAN'S OPINION

### This Year We Celebrate

This will be a year of Jubilees. Three anniversaries that affected Jewish life the world over are coming up this year. Two of these anniversaries are joyous ones, and we are the fortunate generations in whose days these two things came to pass. The third anniversary we wish we had been spared. It is a child of the turbulent times, and was born in woe and in travail.

All the three anniversaries will, we hope, be noted in our community. All three are inter-related.

#### A. The Birth of an Idea.

In the year 1897 the idea was born and named for all to know. In the city of Basel, Switzerland, the birth was announced. And the man who stood at the cradle of the newborn idea and gave it to the world was a journalist from Vienna, now a legend, Dr. Theodor Herzl.

On that year, in the month of August of the year, the First Zionist Congress convened in Basel. Now, in 1957, we look back at the congress that took place sixty years ago, and at what came to pass as a result of that congress, and we find good reason for a Jubilee.

If the men and women of that congress were dreamers only, they and the words they spoke and the resolutions they adopted would have been forgotten today.

A star that stabbed the darkness,

A cry that pierced the wilderness,

And lost without a trace,

And hushed in deep despair.

But the delegates who were stirred by Herzl in Basel were not only obsessed by a great vision, but also driven by a relentless sense of urgency. Not by speeches alone, and not by resolutions only can a people be redeemed. Together with the idea of a Homeland was also born a plan, a practical plan, for the structure of the land. And the World Zionist Party was the trustee of the plan.

And this is why we remember that congress at Basel sixty years later.

In September, 1897, three days after the close of the congress, Herzl wrote in his diary:

"In Basel I established the Jewish State. If I were to say this in public today, I would be met with universal laughter and ridicule. But in five years from now, and certainly in fifty years, this will be seen by everyone."

In fifty years, sounds almost like a prophecy. Exactly fifty years after the Basel congress, in 1948, the Jewish State became a reality. The State of Israel was born.

But the Congress at Basel sixty years ago, did even more than giving birth to an idea, giving it a name, and working out a plan for its future. The congress gave form to three great principles upon which all modern Jewish life is based.

1. The Jewish people is one. No matter what our beliefs, what our station in life, what our lot, we are all Jews. This bond that embraces all Jews is stronger than

boundaries put up by man, and is deeper than the oceans that separate the continents of the earth.

2. We are responsible for the fate that befalls our people everywhere. Let not the Jew in America say, "What have I to do with the Jew in Poland?" And the Jew in Australia may not say, "What is the Jew of Yemen to me?"

Just as your whole body shares in the pain when one tooth is pulled so does the whole Jewish community respond to the cry of the least of its limbs.

3. A people must have a corner on this earth it can call its Homeland. It matters not where an Italian lives, or an Irishman sojourns, or an Englishman makes his home, he knows that there is always Italy, and Ireland, and Britain. So, also, the Jew will be a whole person only when a Jewish Homeland is reborn and established in the Land of our Fathers.

These three principles are now accepted as self-evident, but were viewed either with suspicion or with utter contempt in the days of Herzl.

And so we observe the anniversary of the First Zionist Congress in Basel, Switzerland, sixty years ago.

#### B. The Birth of a State.

Soon, very soon, the letter carrier will bring to your doorstep the good tidings of the other anniversary.

The Tenth Year of the State of Israel.

The seed planted in Basel is

now a tree ten years old, beautiful to behold, and a comfort to the soul of a tortured people.

In the midst of dangers that encompass the land, and in the face of hardships, Israel is preparing to celebrate this anniversary in grand style. And while celebrating, Israel will also count its blessings which are many, proclaim its ideals which are lofty, and unveil its plans for a future which is glorious.

Among the plans announced so far these are the most noteworthy:

1. To make this tenth anniversary a year of a great pilgrimage of Jews to Israel. All of the major Jewish organizations are arranging tours for their members to go and celebrate the birth of Israel in Israel. The various Zionists' groups, the women's organizations, Hadassah and Pioneers, B'nai B'rith, the Arbeiter Ring, and the Jewish labor groups are all scheduling tours for their members in this year of Jubilee.

2. The State of Israel is to send invitations to special guests of many lands. Heads of government, leaders in the world of arts and sciences, eminent men of friendly nations will be the guests of Israel. Heading the list of the American invited guests is Harry S. Truman, whose popularity in Israel is extraordinary.

3. To arrange community wide celebrations from coast to coast. Those of us who are neither invited guests nor paying tourists need not be left out. We, too, will join with the Jews of the world in celebrating the day and to wish the ten year old state long life and prosperity.

The third anniversary to be celebrated this year will be discussed in the next issue of the Herald.

## Expect To Expand Trade With Japan

JERUSALEM—A Japanese industrial mission is expected to visit this country next month to survey possibilities for expansion of trade relations between the two countries. A Foreign Ministry spokesman said last week that Israel is deeply interested in developing trade relations with Japan which, he said, could use Israel phosphates, potash and cement.

The Japanese mission will include a representative of the Japanese shipbuilding industry who will seek an agreement for construction in Japanese yards of tankers for Israel. Japan would presumably be prepared to extend credit to Israel for the construction of tankers.

Pinhas Saphir, Israel Minister of Trade and Industry, will leave in November for a trip to Japan, Burma, the Philippines and other far Eastern countries, and will discuss possible credit arrangements in Tokyo.

Two Japanese mining experts, representing Tokyo mining interests, arrived in Israel recently for talks with the Israel Mining Corporation, the governmental agency in control of mining in the country. The experts want to survey Israel mining prospects.



**VIENNA** — Discrimination against Jewish writers in the Soviet Union and the liquidation of Jewish cultural life there evoked a number of "open questions" at a meeting arranged by the Union of Soviet Writers in Moscow, Warsaw newspapers arriving here reported recently.  
 The Moscow meeting was arranged in honor of the delegates

to the World Youth Festival. About 800 delegates attended the gathering and were permitted to ask questions. "Why is there not a single Soviet Jewish writer present at this meeting?" one of the delegates asked. He pointed out that while writers of other national minorities in the Soviet Union had been invited, no such invitation had been sent by the Union of Soviet writers to Jewish literary men, as far as he had been able to establish.

**Indict Gestapo Men For Murder of Jews**

**STUTT GART** — Three former Gestapo officials, including the head of an "extermination" unit in Tilsit who allegedly boasted that he had "disposed of" 132,000 Jews, have been indicted for the murder of 5,502 Lithuanian Jews in 1941, the district attorney here disclosed last week. Seven other lesser Gestapo agents were also indicted as accomplices. The trial date has not yet been set.

The principal defendant in the proceedings is 53-year-old Bernard Fischer-Schweder, former Nazi police chief of Tilsit, in East Prussia. During the German invasion of the Soviet Union in 1941 he supervised an "extermination" unit which, according to a report it submitted to Gestapo headquarters in October of that year, had claimed 132,000 Jewish victims.

The district attorney said that documentation for the deaths of 5,502 Lithuanian Jews was available, and that he had gathered depositions from 119 witnesses.

Evidence against Fischer-Schweder had been introduced at the Nuremberg war crimes trials, but he could not be found at the time. Under an assumed name, he had obtained work in a refugee camp at Ulm, and had risen to the post of director there. His superiors were said to have known his Gestapo past but did not expose him until he sued them in a salary dispute. In retaliation, they revealed his wartime career with the Nazis. As a result, the district attorney here investigated the case and brought about the indictment.

Facts and Fancy

Is it possible that more Jewish boys are becoming interested in careers in professional baseball? Quite a few new names are to be noted in the various minor leagues. Here's a sampling —

Schenectady of the Eastern League features a pretty fair pitcher named Joe Golden . . . Colorado Springs of the Western League has another hurler named Rosenbaum . . . Al Israel, third baseman for Columbia of the Sally League, recently broke up a no-hit game with a two-out ninth inning single after the catcher dropped his pop foul . . . And Ron Rozman of Augusta in the same circuit may wind up with a perfect season. He has won 13 games in a row.

Slightly higher up in the league ratings is still another pitcher, Cohen, of Memphis in the Southern Association. Whether this is the Hy Cohen who came up briefly a year ago with the Chicago Cubs I don't know; at any rate he leads the loop in earned run average

with 2.68, and his 15-5 won and lost record is just one half game off the leader's pace.

There is an Abrams with Toronto of the International League; but that is an old friend, Cal, formerly of the big leagues, and Cal is on the way down, not up. This discussion deals with youngsters who may go places.

If the Red Sox continue their system of selecting managers from their farm system, the next field boss at Fenway Park might well be the old Flash, Joe Gordon, who has done a fine job with the San Francisco club. The Boston farm club was in first place by 4½ games going into the final weeks of the season.

Things I don't understand — I have always read and heard about Tom Brewer's curve ball being his best pitch. One of the best curves in the entire league, I have heard time and again. At least, I thought I did. Now comes an article in a leading sports magazine, purporting to be the authentic secret ratings of American League players taken from the files of one of the teams in the league. And here is what it says:

"Tom Brewer is a strong-armed young man with a good fast ball and a fair curve . . ."

Get that "fair curve" business. Who's kidding whom? If Brewer really has the hook that we fans always have been led to believe he has, then this particular club doesn't have very accurate data on the rest of the league. On the other hand, if these secret ratings are accurate, then somebody has been bamboozling us with a heck of an effective optical illusion.

Another puzzler: A couple of weeks ago, when the Yankees went into Chicago for a real crucial series (The Yanks had a 3½ game lead and were floundering badly), Paul Richards, Baltimore's all-around major-domo, forecast loudly that the Yanks would win the pennant easily, and he gave a list of assorted reasons.

So the Yanks took three straight from the White Sox, and everyone took it for granted that the pen-

nant race was over. Whereupon Richards, who three days earlier was so positive New York was in, made another pronouncement to the effect that the Yanks "still can be taken".

What makes this story even more puzzling is that Stengel's crew has acted out Richards' predictions to the hilt. He said they would win, and they took their only rival three straight. He said they could be taken, and the club went into a tailspin that had Yankee fans and brass badly worried.

the third base foul line in Chicago's Comiskey Park is sloped upward to help keep Nellie Fox' push-bunts in fair territory. This little gimmick gives Nellie 20 extra hits a year."

\* "A couple of years ago, Cleveland was notorious for sloping its third base line outward so that the slow-hit balls down the line would roll foul. The reason? Al Rosen, the third baseman, was none too fast and had trouble handling this play."

\* "On the same Cleveland field, the strip of infield between third and short was left unwatered to aid Cleveland's numerous right-handed hitters. When ground balls hit on this 'concrete' strip, they shot through the hole into left field like a bullet. Conversely, the same strip between first and second base was watered down and the grass was allowed to grow. This stopped the left-handed hitters of the opposition."

\* "In a game at Baltimore, Sammy White of the Red Sox hit a hard grounder that slithered to a stop inside of third base. After he had been thrown

## Many Capitol Jewish Families Have No Synagogue Affiliation

WASHINGTON — The slender stock of verified information about attributes of American Jews was increased this week by a report on a survey of the 80,900 Jews of Washington, D. C.

The survey, based on interviews and statistical tabulations by the division of research of the American University, disclosed that Washington's Jews represent 4.7 per cent of the city's total population and that 80 per cent are native-born Americans.

The survey, sponsored by the Jewish Community Council of Greater Washington and published under the title of "The Jewish Population of Greater Washington in 1956" disclosed also that a third of working Washington Jews are professionals and that a third have annual incomes of \$10,000 or more. Half own their homes.

There are 27,000 households in which at least one adult is Jewish,

including 3,300 "mixed" households — Jewish and non-Jewish. A third of working Jews are government employees.

Half of the native-born have native-born parents and of the foreign-born, two-thirds arrived in the United States before 1933.

Most Jewish men do not belong to any Jewish organization and most Jewish women belong to at least one. Half of the families said they had no synagogue affiliation.

Of the approximately 14,000 families which were affiliated, the breakdowns were as follows: About half identified themselves with the Conservative wing, about a fourth with Orthodoxy and about an eighth with Reform, the rest either uncertain or belonging to more than one synagogue.

Up to 90 percent of the men had "some Jewish education." The corresponding figure for women was 60 to 70 per cent.

## To Hold Festival Portraying Growth

JERUSALEM — An exhibition portraying Israel's achievements during the first ten years of statehood and forecasting trends for the coming decade will be opened here next June for three months.

Officials said the exhibit would be modeled after the "Festival of Britain" of 1951, with the basic similarity to be reflected in the fact that the exhibit will aim to show all aspects of the first decade of statehood, including the political, economic, immigration, labor security and cultural phases.

The exhibition will cover more than three acres and will involve a budget of 1,500,000 Israeli pounds. The Jerusalem Municipality has planned a number of promotional efforts for the exhibit which will be closed Saturdays in deference to Orthodox opinion.

## Spain Opens Doors To No. African Jews

LONDON — The Spanish Government will "afford the fullest hospitality" to any Jew from North Africa, particularly those of Spanish background, who might want to settle in Spain, the Spanish Ambassador in London has informed the Agudas Israel World Organization, the latter revealed.

The Agudah sent a delegation to express concern for the welfare of Jews in North Africa and to point out that in view of recent developments some of them might wish to go to Spain. The Ambassador, Duke de Primo Rivera, also noted that the large Jewish communities of Tetuan, Melida and Ceuta were still under the jurisdiction of Spain and that the future of that area of North Africa was still under discussion.

The Agudah representatives noted that the Conference on Jewish Material Claims Against Germany had provided funds to the Jewish community of Madrid for the erection of a synagogue and community center in the Spanish capital where at present the law forbids open worship. The Agudists expressed the hope that the Franco regime would assist the synagogue-center project by public recognition. The Duke promised to raise the matter with Madrid.

Mrs. Myron Silverstein, program chairman, has arranged to have Cornelius Horan, superintendent of the Rhode Island School for Boys as guest speaker. He will speak on the program, problems and needs of the boys at the school.

Mrs. Jack Jessel, Jr. and Mrs. Irving Sigal, hospitality chairmen, have planned a sherry hour to precede the meeting. All members and their guests are invited to attend.

But for every one on this boat, who has reached a safe haven, hundreds and thousands are still waiting, still living in fear, still subject to the whims of dictators and the hatred of fanatics.

It costs \$1,000 to save just one of these people.

At least 100,000 MORE must be brought to Israel in 1957. To do this we must give generously to the Emergency Rescue Fund, over and above our regular contribution.
