## To Set Up D-Day Headquarters At Narragansett Hotel Sunday

Leaders of the 1958 campaign of the General Jewish Committee today expressed optimism that D-Day next Sunday will be one of the most successful one-day drives in its history as this year's fund-raising drive moves forward.

Leonard Y. Goldman, D-Day chairman, said workers have displayed an unprecedented amount of enthusiasm in meetings held the past few weeks and are set for the concentrated one-day house-to-house canvass for contributions or pledges.

Headquarters have again been set up at the Narragansett Hotel where some 50 captains and their workers will report at 9 A.M. for breakfast. GJC officials have made provisions for free parking in the lot adjoining the hotel.

Following breakfast, the workers will be given a final briefing and

instructions, and cards to be solicited will be distributed. The workers will report back with the results as soon as they have covered all the cards assigned to them. A tentative tally of D-Day contributions and pledges then will be made at headquarters.

## James Rhea To Lead Discussion At JCC

James Rhea, feature writer for the Providence Journal-Bulletin and prize winning author of articles on life and frictions in the South, will serve as discussion leader at the first of a monthly series of adult discussion programs to be conducted at the East Side Jewish Community Center on Sunday, Nov. 9, at 8:30 P.M.

"Is Integration Proceeding Too Quickly?" will be the subject of Mr. Rhea's discussion. Legal efforts undertaken by the NAACP, the recent bombing terrors in the South and the "Private School" moves in Little Rock, Arkansas and other Southern areas will be included in the evening's program. Melvin Chernick, chairman of the discussion series, will serve as the evening's moderator.

Admission to the discussion program will be open to all interested adults.

## Report Jew Jailed For Getting Paper

PARIS — The Yiddish language "Unzer Stimme" reported that a Jew in the Soviet town of Grodno was given a three-year prison term for receiving from Warsaw the Yiddish language "Folkstimme," which is a Communist newspaper.

The "Unzer Stimme" account was based on an eye-witness report from a Jew arriving here from behind the Iron Curtain. His name was withheld by the newspaper. According to his report, A. Aberman, an elderly Jewish war invalid, was at a factory meeting where the errors of the Communist regime were being criticized.

Aberman asked when the Yiddish press would again be permitted in the Soviet Union. The next day Soviet police appeared at Aberman's home and arrested him on a charge of possessing the Warsaw Yiddish daily, according to "Unzer Stimme."

## To Give Citation To Mrs. Roosevelt

NEW YORK — Mrs. Franklin Delano Roosevelt will be cited as "Woman of the Year" at the sixth annual luncheon of the Women's Division of the American Friends of Hebrew University Nov. 5.

The former First Lady, who recently observed her 74th birthday, will be presented with an illuminated scroll which will be inscribed on the frontispiece of a limited editions copy of the Biblical Book of Ruth illustrated by the late Arthur Szyk.



**To Be Speaker** — Max Lerner will be the first speaker in Temple Emanuel's Institute of Jewish Studies for Adults. He will speak on "The Middle East—Key to World Peace," on Wednesday evening at 9 o'clock at Temple Emanuel.

Mr. Lerner, author, teacher, journalist, has taught at several colleges, and is now Professor of American Civilization and Dean of the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences of Brandeis University. His most recent book "America As a Civilization" was published in 1954. He has traveled extensively and was a war correspondent in Germany during World War II. He currently writes a column for the New York Post.

## Ask Easing Of Emigration Barriers

LONDON — A delegation from the Board of Deputies of British Jews called on the Rumanian Minister to London to discuss lowering of emigration barriers in Rumania for Israel-bound Jews, the Board's foreign affairs committee reported here.

During the meeting, the board delegates stressed the humanitarian aspects of reuniting families divided between Israel and Rumania when the Bucharest Government suddenly clamped a lid on Jewish emigration some years back. The board also raised the question of Rumanian Zionist leaders who, following their release from prison several years ago, were promised permission to leave for Israel but still have not been provided with the necessary exit documents.

The foreign affairs committee's announcement said that it received reports from abroad that some 1,800 Jews have been allowed to quit Rumania for Israel. On the other hand, these reports speak of many new arrests among Rumanian Jews. Pending clarification of the picture, the board has decided to hold up further action.

The board's foreign affairs unit also expressed concern over recent actions of the Bourguiba Government of Tunisia — the friendliest toward Jews in any of the Arab states — which dissolved Jewish communal organizations, set up new groups to represent the Jews,

and appointed a chief rabbi without prior consultation with the communities. Although the civic rights of Jews have not been interfered with, the government "frowns upon" any relationships between Jews in Tunisia and Jews abroad, it was pointed out.

Meanwhile, another board unit, the Trades Advisory Council, lashed out at the wave of violence in Britain springing from racial prejudice. Offering its support to the government and voluntary organizations seeking to "stamp out this evil," the council, which concerns itself with anti-Semitism and discrimination in industry and commerce, called for "practical steps in the creation of good-will between all races and peoples of all religions."

## Teen Agers Reply On 'Going Steady'

MINNEAPOLIS — Aroused by rabbis' and women's groups leaders' censure of teen-age "going steady," the younger generation has reacted with a fervent plea for understanding and an end to interference by their elders, reports the American Jewish World.

In what might be termed characteristic of the adolescent revolt against authority, leaders of a number of Twin Cities youth groups voiced the demand of today's teenagers that their individual needs and differences be respected and that they be allowed to make their own decisions. Most, however, went along with the general belief that "going steady" should be preparation for marriage.

### Foolish for Teens

Carolyn Fineberg, retiring vice-president of the Mount Zion Temple Youth Group, said: "Going steady" is foolish at this age . . . If you're tied down, you lose the chance of finding the right person to eventually marry. But whether right or wrong, I do not think that rabbis should interfere. To me, a basic ideal of Judaism is the freedom to believe what you want to believe, and not be dictated to, as in some other religions."

Jan Dechter, vice-president of Adath Jeshurum United Synagogue Youth, told the American Jewish World it's up to the individual. "If you have a mature, intelligent attitude and can handle yourself well, there's nothing

## Board Eases Restrictions On Films For First Time

JERUSALEM — For the first time Israel has allowed a picture which shows some sympathy to a Nazi to be shown in Israeli movies.

Irwin Shaw's "The Young Lions," in which one of the leading characters is a German army officer, has been shown to audiences in Jerusalem without major incident.

In the film, the army officer, because he is disillusioned with the excesses of the Nazi movement, is portrayed in a sympathetic light. Opposite him is a bewildered American Jew who must fight both against the Germans and the crude anti-Semitism of an infantry company.

The decision to license "The Lions" was a painful one for the 17 members of the board, who must approve each motion picture in Israel.

Until the showing of "The Young Lions," Israel's Film Censorship Board had carefully cut from every picture any scenes that showed any sympathy toward a

Nazi.

Until two years ago any German-language film, regardless of its vintage or who made it, was banned.

The film has some violent battle scenes and a brutal sequence showing the horrors of a concentration camp.

This was potentially volatile material for viewers who had lost mothers and sisters in these camps or themselves had been in them.

But the only audible reactions at one crowded showing last week were a few gentle hisses at some of the more contentious pronouncements of Marlon Brando as the German officer.

"We realized we were taking a risk in releasing this picture," Zeev Meljon, spokesman for the board said.

"We didn't believe that a Nazi such as Mr. Brando's character ever existed," he went on. "But we were in a difficult spot. You see, the film had been banned in Egypt because the Jewish soldier was

shown in a very good light. It would have been a bit too ironic if we had banned it here for being pro-Nazi."

But the board still keeps a tight hold on other films involving Germany.

It has a blacklist of German and Austrian film stars and directors who were Nazi sympathizers. It will not allow the showing of a film in which they participate.

The board still will not license films that come directly from either East or West Germany. The modern German-language films that are permitted have been made by non-German companies or by joint German and foreign companies.

"We have yet to see an anti-Nazi picture from either Germany," Mr. Meljon said. "When we do, maybe we'll change our minds."

Like the film review boards in many other countries, the Israeli board scans all movies for excessive sex, cruelty or crime. In addition

**Anti-Semitic Group Indorses Bombings**

CHICAGO — Allen Mann, 22-year-old leader of the Illinois Section of the National States Rights Party told reporters: "I completely indorse the bombings in Peoria and Atlanta and elsewhere. Only when the Jews are afraid to appear in the streets will we be able to keep them in check."

"I'm pleased that people in all parts of the country are beginning to wake up to the nature of the ills of the nation," Mann told the New York Post. It's not the synagogues, it's the people who go to the synagogues, the Jews."

Police described five men indicted in the Atlanta bombing as members of the National States Rights Party.

**Aimed at Jews**  
Mann said his local unit of the party had "a nucleus" of between 35 to 60 members who meet secretly.

The aim of the party, he said, is the destruction of the "Jewish conspiracy."

"The Jews are out to destroy the white race and all Christendom, for that matter," he said. "They are about to put America in chains."

Mrs. Peter Cowan of New Albany, Ind., vice-chairman of the National States Rights Party, told the New York Post. "Aren't they (the Jews) asking for it?"

"Our enemy is the Jew and the Communist — the Negro is only a pawn, only he doesn't know it," she told the N. Y. Post.

"Jewish rabbis are certainly promoting integration — I don't know what's wrong with them, being brainwashed or intimidated like that . . ."

She insisted that violence such as bombings was "a natural result of all the frustration we've had."

# Foods to Remember

One of our favorites for fall and winter appetite-teasers is the tiny pickled gherkin. These add zest to any meat or fish meal. This time of the year they are plentiful and inexpensive, if you don't happen to grow your own. We call them

## SWEET GHERKINS (The smaller the better)

### Pickling solution:

- 1 quart cider vinegar
- 3 lbs. dark brown sugar
- 2 tablespoons whole mixed spice, in muslin bag
- 3 cinnamon sticks, 2½ or 3 inch lengths

Bring to a quick boil and use as directed below.

Procedure: Wash and pat dry all the little cucumbers and place in a crock or large glass container. Cover with a solution of salt and cold water. ½ cup salt to each 4 quarts of water, and let stand at room temperature 24 hours. Drain thoroughly, rinse in hot water and drain again or wipe dry with paper towels. Turn into hot solution and let stand till cold. Pack into wide top glass jars, ½ pint size if pre-

ferred for easy storage. Be sure to cover gherkins in jars with the pickling solution.

Variation: For a nippy Gherkin Pickle, reduce brown sugar to half. Add 1 tablespoon curry powder, or 1 teaspoon ground red pepper to the hot pickling solution.

Yield depends on size of gherkins and compactness in jars.

For a taste-thrill we like to put up some purple plums relish this time of the year. Plums are excellent eating out of hand, of course, but the novelty of relish made of them is really something. We serve this Meichel with almost any meat dish whether it be beef, veal, lamb or poultry. Here's the recipe for

### PURPLE PLUM CHUTNEY

- 24 to 36 purple plums, halved, pits removed
- 1 cup seedless raisins, light or dark
- ¾ cup cider vinegar
- 1 cup brown sugar, tightly packed
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1 tablespoon mustard seeds
- 3 cloved garlic, mashed well
- 1 small onion, diced fine
- ½ cup finely diced preserved ginger (or 1 tablespoon ground ginger)

Have the prepared plums and raisins ready before measuring the other listed ingredients into a preserving kettle. Cover. Bring to a boil, add the plums and raisins and let simmer 35 to 40 minutes or till thickened. Stir only to prevent sticking or scorching. Shake the cooking pot from time to time. Turn into hot sterilized half pint jars and seal while hot.

Yields approximately 6 half-pint jars. Can be used as soon as cold.

tion, it has other standards more typically Israeli.

It will not pass any picture that is critical of any religion. Neither will it approve a film that ridicules another government, even an Arab government.

The board cut scenes from "The Robe" that, according to Mr. Meljon, "showed the glories of Christ at the expense of Judaism." It banned entirely "The Path of Glory" because the film "disparaged the French Army." Also banned was a picture showing that Stalin had not died but had flown to Greece with the Soviet treasury.

Yet, with an eye to Israel's large Arab-speaking audiences, the board licenses Egyptian films imported from a neutral country.

Last week, in addition to "The Young Lions," five German-language films were being shown in Israel to large audiences.

"We would never have dared allow this five years ago," Mr. Meljon said. "But our audiences seem much more sophisticated now. Maybe it would be more accurate to say more tolerant. At any rate, they haven't dismantled any of our cinemas."

## Place More Stress On Middle East

LONDON — A protege of Nikita S. Khrushchev, has been placed in charge of Soviet policy in the Arab world, according to a United Press International dispatch from here last week.

Reports indicate that the USSR is placing increasing emphasis on the importance of its relations with the Arab world. As part of the policy, Russian institutions and schools for Oriental studies have been steadily expanding.

The UPI report says that dispatches from behind the Iron Curtain indicate that Mukhitdinov is a leader in Russian policy planning in the Middle East. He first was mentioned in the forefront of Russian leaders last December when he succeeded the ousted Soviet Defense Minister, Georgi Zhukov, in the Soviet Presidium.

The 41-year-old son of poor peasants in the Asian Soviet Republic of Uzbekistan, he recently went to Cairo for talks with UAR President Gamal Abdel Nasser.

## Golda Meir, Dulles Discuss Situation

WASHINGTON—Israel Foreign Minister Golda Meir met with Secretary of State John Foster Dulles for 40 minutes recently and later described the conference as "a very pleasant call" and "an interesting discussion of the situation in the Middle East."

Israeli sources later revealed that the conversation between Mrs. Meir and Secretary Dulles confirmed the existence of general harmony of thinking of the two governments on the position in the Middle East and on Israel's right to a sense of security.

The conversation dealt with the broader questions of policy and appraisal and will be followed by discussions in the normal channels on broader questions of policy.

# AJC Hails Decision Of New York Board

NEW YORK — The American Jewish Congress hailed as a "major victory for religious freedom and separation of church and state" the decision of New York's Board of Hospitals to lift a ban on birth control therapy in city-operated hospitals.

The A J Congress had led a city-wide drive to mobilize community opposition to the ban. More than 30 New York civic and religious organizations answered an AJ Congress call for cooperative action in fighting the ban. The Congress was the only national Jewish agency to take a public stand on the issue.

The situation erupted in July when Hospitals Commissioner Morris Jacobs barred a physician in a city-operated hospital from fitting a contraceptive device on a Protestant woman suffering from diabetes. Commissioner Jacobs offered no explanation, but it was clear his action was based on the fact that some groups have religious objections to medical treatment which includes the use of contraceptives.

VIENNA — Disquieting reports of a new wave of arrests of Jews in Czechoslovakia and Rumania have been reaching this city in recent weeks, it was disclosed here by informed sources with access to information on the Jewish situation in the satellite countries.


The reports disclosed the arrest in Czechoslovakia of a number of Jewish community leaders accused of "Zionism" and of allegedly having sought to torpedo the good relations between Prague and Cairo.

Before the men were jailed their homes were searched for what the security police called anti-Nasser material.

Only four of the arrested leaders have so far been identified — Ernest Meisel and Walter Stein of Prague, Ernest Loew of Prosnitz and Tiberius Ney of Karlsbad.

In Rumania the authorities rounded up six Jews, all in the city of Timisora. Two of the arrested men are former bankers, Ehrenfreund and Reinholz.

# The Franco-Israeli Rapprochement: A Necessity

By Saint-Evremond

The past, present and future importance of the region situated at the eastern end of the Mediterranean should be self-evident to any observer, whether he considers it from the cultural, the economic, the geo-political or any other point of view. The lands of the nearer East, of the Bible, of the classical Orient, loom very large at the crossroads of civilization, all along the millennia of a checkered history, even though they retain something of their ancient mystery, and the inner springs of their life remain alien and incomprehensible to many a Westerner.

This so-called Middle East is important not only because of its oil reserves. Even if there were no such resources in its subsoil, the strategic location of its territory would suffice to ensure its prominence in the affairs of mankind. Moreover, this region is also a cradle of human thought and religious faith; and, alas, an explosive center of fanatical passions.

By virtue of its geographic position the Middle East is a bar which locks or a key that unlocks the Mediterranean basin. And therefore France, as a Mediterranean power, is permanently and vitally interested in the Middle East.

French interest in this area is not something new. The presence of so many French missions and Christian missionaries in the Orient is proof enough of this traditional involvement of France. One should never forget that the first Crusade was preached among Frenchmen. It was from the now deserted beaches of Aigues Mortes that Saint Louis sailed forth to punish — already! — the aggressive

Infidels of Egypt; just as it is from Toulon that another French fleet put to sea in 1956, toward a similar destination.

Indeed, French blood has been shed abundantly on the soil which witnessed the first growth of Christianity.

However, this 'Oriental' policy of France was never determined solely by religious idealism. The necessity of preserving, or restoring, a balance of power played often a paramount role. Thus, in the sixteenth century, king Francis was not afraid of scandalizing Christian Europe by allying himself with the Ottoman sultan, Soliman the Magnificent. Not religion, but strategy determined the relations of Louis XIV with the Sublime Porte, and inspired Napoleon Bonaparte in his endeavor to break out of the Mediterranean by occupying Egypt. In a sense, his hope was fulfilled, but on the peaceful level of economics, by another Frenchman, Ferdinand de Lesseps, who built the Suez canal: a lifeline for the freedom of which France fought again, two years ago, with but limited success.

Today, when the tide of Pan-Arabism spills over into Africa and threatens the entire balance of the Mediterranean, France must seek once more a counterpoise in the Levant, that is on the easternmost shores of the Inner Sea.

Such counterpoise cannot be found outside a rapprochement between France and Israel. For in the midst of growing dangers, Israel struggles on optimistically as a bridgehead of the West, as a carrier of Western values and progress, despite the lengthening shadows of barbarism that are now engulfing other countries in the East.

There are those who cast doubts on the solidity and opportunity of a Franco-Israeli alliance. They point out that oil is not found in Israel but elsewhere in the Middle East (this precious oil, for the sake of which a shameful recognition was given to the blood-stained junta of Iraq). They claim that France is a 'Moslem power' (because many million Moslems inhabit the French territories overseas), and that therefore she must try and befriend the numberless Moslem people of the world. — Arabs and non-Arabs, — rather than the Israelis, who are only two millions.

Such reasonings, which plume themselves with the feathers of realism, are really specious oversimplifications.

Oil is not everything, and will not last forever. Developments which are going on in the U. S. A., in the U. S. S. R., in Britain, in France and elsewhere hold the promise that nuclear energy shall feed much of our industries, perhaps within a decade from now. The so-called 'Arab' Middle East will then have to relinquish its stranglehold on Europe's sources of power.

As to the argument of sheer numbers: between the huge, ponderous but sluggish and backward masses which form the 'Arab' section of the Islamic world, and a small Israel, active, optimistic and remarkably efficient, there is indeed much to choose. And France has made her choice — in favor of the smaller people, with the big creative drive.

Should a *modus vivendi* be reached in the Middle East, it would be only for Israel to play the part of a connecting link be-

tween Europe and the various Levantine communities. The traditions of the people of Israel, their roots in both the Orient and the Occident, as well as Israel's political and military weight, could then serve the purposes of a broader confederation, where all the nations and denominations of the Levant would find their rightful place.

Is such a belief in any way heretical or over-optimistic? Not in 1958, when windows unto a wider world are opening everywhere, when the concept of nationality is being enlarged and the principle of mutual racial and religious toleration made (so we hope) more meaningful.

Anyhow, France, guided by General de Gaulle, shall maintain and reinforce her ties of friendship with the courageous State of Israel. In 1956, France has shown to all the free world where her sympathies lay. She will continue to

act accordingly, not only on the political, but on the economic and cultural levels.

There is, indeed, on top of everything else, a cultural and spiritual affinity between these two peoples, which reflects the trends of their history. They have not only given birth to great ideals, but fought strenuously for their implementation. The France of 1789, of 1848, and of 1958, can only welcome the modern State of Israel, which since its war of independence in 1948 has been waging a permanent revolution for the benefit of human progress.

Together, with their joint courage, intelligence and spirit of toleration, France and Israel may contribute decisively — once more — to the common civilization of the Mediterranean world, and to the improvement of its less developed provinces in the Middle East.

## Israel Acquires New Submarine

LONDON — Planes of the Israel Navy flew over the Israel fleet's newest acquisition, the first of two 715 ton submarines being delivered to Israel by Britain.

At brief services in the Portsmouth Navy Yard on Oct. 9, the Union Jack was lowered on the H. M. S. Springer," the Israel ensign was hoisted, and an Israel complement formally took over the craft, renamed "Tanin" (whale).

At exactly 11:30 a. m., the British and Israeli officers crossed the bridge of the "H. M. S Dorset" through a 26-man guard of honor and were piped aboard. The commander of the guard then ordered: "Haul down the main," and the Union Jack came slowly tumbling down the "Springer's" mast as the company saluted.

After some minutes, a British duty officer announced: "Submarine ready for transfer." The flag of Israel was then raised on the craft and Israel took possession of the first submarine she has ever owned.

In accepting the submarine, Commander Aluf Tankus, Chief of Staff of the Israel Navy, recalled that in 1955 the Royal Navy had turned two destroyers over to the Israel Navy. "Now," he said, "we are changing the flag of the submarine 'Springer.'" We understand the heavy responsibility which rests on us, but we hope for the Royal Navy's assistance, for which we have been grateful in the past and for which we shall be grateful in the future. We now take command of this submarine. In the name of the Israeli defense forces, we accept this vessel."

### The Second Sub

The second of the two submarines purchased from Britain, the "Sanguine," will be transferred to Israel before the end of the year. It will be renamed the "Rahav." Both of the 13-year-old vessels were extensively overhauled before the sale.

The vessels normally carry a crew of six officers and 50 enlisted men. They can remain submerged for three weeks with use of their snorkels, and for 24 hours without the snorkels. A British naval official said that normally two years of training are needed by crews but "the Israelis can probably manage in six to nine months."

Financial terms of the sale were not disclosed, but it was believed they were favorable to Israel. The sale was considered a direct consequence of the clear-cut change in British policy which followed the revolutionary upheaval in Iraq last July. It was known that some British leaders felt that the need to equip Israel with submarines was urgent for the security not only of the Middle East, but also for that of all the NATO countries. However, it was also pointed out that among those British sources which contended that the sale did not represent a major shift in British policy, it was believed that the sale was in accordance with the 1950 Tripartite Declaration, which favors a balance of military power in the Middle East. It was understood that the U. S. and France, the two other signatories to the Tripartite Declaration, were informed in advance of the sale.

## Assistant Rabbi To Be Installed

Rabbi Jerome S. Gurland will be installed this evening as Assistant Rabbi of Temple Beth El by Rabbi Morris Lieberman of the Baltimore Hebrew Congregation. Ordained in 1958 at Hebrew Union College, he has served Congregation Beth-El in Winchester, Va., and became assistant Rabbi at Temple Beth El in Providence in July, 1958.

## Release Nazi Aide From German Prison

FRANKFURT — Hermann Krume, one-time aide to Adolf Eichmann, the Nazi leader who organized the campaign of mass annihilation of European Jewry, was released from prison here where he had been held on charges of murdering 88 children in the Czech village of Lidice, whose entire population was murdered by the Nazis after the assassination of Reinhard Heydrich.

Meanwhile official investigations continue of Krume's participation in the deportation and subsequent murder of 450,00 Hungarian Jews in the summer of 1944.

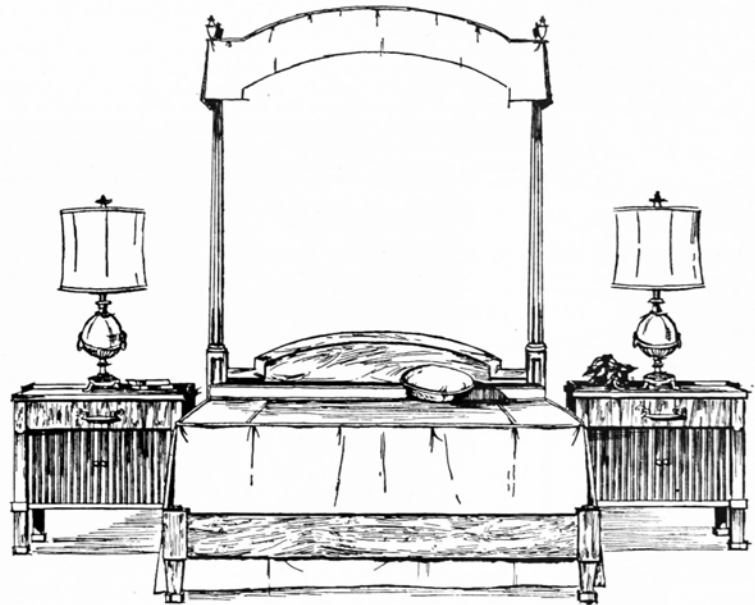

# UAR Refuses To Extradite Eisele

BONN — The United Arab Republic has refused to extradite to West Germany Dr. Hans Eisele, a concentration camp doctor who fled to Cairo to escape arrest on war crimes charges, a spokesman for the West German Foreign Office revealed here.

The spokesman said the UAR authorities based their refusal on a statutes of limitation law which provides that alleged crimes must be prosecuted within 10 years.

Dr. Eisele escaped to Egypt last June after he was accused by witnesses at the trial of Martin Sommer, Buchenwald camp guard, of having murdered Buchenwald prisoners with phenol injections. His escape touched off a series of inquiries into the Munich police department and prosecutor's office. An investigation of State Attorney Max von Dackey, accused of having deliberately deferred the arrest, is still in progress.

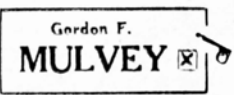

### One Of Our Managers Is Missing

For some time I have followed the progress of Andy Cohen up the managerial ladder. With some setbacks along the way, Andy Cohen slowly but surely has been working up closer to the big time. During each of the past two seasons, Cohen handled a Triple A ball club. Last year he achieved a rare distinction. He was hired by Denver on the strong recommendation of the Yankees. And when the Yankees held their spring instructional school, Andy was on the staff.

Then bad luck set in. The New York club was feeding players to the Denver club, and also trying to help Eddie Lopat with players at Richmond. The result — neither Lopat nor Cohen got enough good players, and neither could go very far.

Now the Yanks have dropped the Denver club, and will concentrate all their Triple A efforts in Richmond. That seemed to leave Andy Cohen out in the cold. But suddenly I read that Denver is looking for a new manager. There is no mention of Cohen. Lopat, too, is gone. But he has been moved upstairs as the Yankees' pitching coach for all its young prospects. So the managerial post in Richmond is vacant.

Can it be that Andy Cohen was kept in the Yankees' official family, and given the Richmond portfolio? That's what I'm trying to find out now.

If it turns out yes, then Cohen gets a wonderful break, and may yet become the first Jewish manager in major league baseball. If he has merely been dropped, it will be another blow in a long career that has been studded with such blows.

The point is that some six months ago, this column wrote the script for the American League season, and sent copies to the Yankees, White Sox, Red Sox, Tigers, and Indians. It is now my unpleasant obligation to report that some of

these teams can't recognize good writing when they see it. The no-goods went and changed the script.

In other words, I picked the White Sox for fourth and they finished second; the Tigers for second, and they wound up fifth; the Indians fifth, and they climbed one notch.

The column picked the Yankees to win, and wasn't that nice of me? Only Joe Reichler, among the nation's masterminds, didn't. The Red Sox to finish third, and they . . . HEY! I got one right! Boston DID finish third! What a genius! What's my average . . . 40%?

But wait! Don't go away yet. You're liable to be surprised.

As a forecaster, the column was for the birds. But as an analyst — well, that was slightly different. Let's take a look at some of the things said in this space last April:

" . . . I cannot conceive that the White Sox are a pennant threat . . ." They weren't, never coming within ten games of the Yanks.

"This (Chicago) is the best starting staff in the League? Not by my standards!" White Sox pitchers were way off the beam for two thirds of the season.

" . . . aging and slipping Early Wynn, whose days of glory will be spread considerably farther apart from now on." They definitely were. Wynn was a horrible disap-

pointment to Chicago.

"Jim Wilson's effectiveness usually fades around mid-season and then returns only occasionally . . ." Jim didn't even have a good first half this time, and he now has retired from baseball.

"Bob Keegan, strictly an in-and-out." Bob was so bad he was in and out of the majors all season as the White Sox gave up on him for the year.

" . . . Bill Fischer, a sophomore whose record guarantees nothing." One of Chicago's brightest pitching hopes in April, Fischer was traded before mid-season.

" . . . I don't think Chicago's hitting will be as bad as it is painted . . ." It wasn't. The Sox had better hitting than even they hoped.

" . . . The Red Sox do not shape up as a solid contender." How true!

"Don't expect much from rookie (Bob Shaw); he may have worked himself out in winter ball . . ." He sure did. Buck was a bitter disappointment to Detroit, did little for Chicago when traded there.

Actually, one club loused up my forecasts. That was Detroit, which I picked for second. While I pointed out deficiencies on the Tigers' ball club, I felt that the intelligent leadership of Jack Tighe, and the club's new spirit, would combine with their terrific hitting to give the Yanks a run for the pennant.

Alas, Detroit never got off the ground. Their fuses failed to ignite. The pitchers floundered for more than half the season, and their big hitters succumbed, like the Yankees, to the tremendously fine pitching that was extant throughout the American League. Tighe

# Bonn Dismisses Consul von Saucken

BONN — The West German Foreign Ministry announced recently that Dr. Hans von Saucken has been fired for making an anti-Semitic remark to an Austrian-born American correspondent. Earlier, von Saucken had been suspended from his position at the German Consulate General in New York and sent home for further investigation of the incident.

The Foreign Office statement said that, "The clear and indisputable declaration of the chief witness that the statement actually had been made must be accepted."

The incident developed when von Saucken allegedly called Max Beer, a correspondent for Swiss and German newspapers, "a dirty Jew." Beer, who had lost many relatives in Auschwitz concentration camp, protested to the West German government.

Following this week's news of von Saucken's dismissal, Beer was quoted by the New York Times as saying: "I regret the fate of Consul General von Saucken, but I never considered this disturbing affair as one concerning only me and him as individuals. For much more was involved — the principle of tolerance and the respect for a human community that had so cruelly suffered under the nazis."

was fired early, and that was that. In a way, I also forecast the prolonged Yankee slump — thusly:

"First among . . . handicaps for the team to overcome . . . is the mammoth Yankee Stadium, where alone of all parks the fences have not been brought in . . . This is a collection of real long ball hitters who cannot possibly show to their best advantage when they play at home. In fact, the club is always happy to go on the road . . ." The Yanks proved that all year, with anemic hitting at home against those vast distances; and in the World Series, the champs hit eight homers in Milwaukee, only two in New York.

"The Yankees face better pitching day by day than any team in history ever did before. Every club in the league saves its best hurlers — or those who give New York the most trouble—to throw against them. This, of course, is ruinous on a team's hitting." It was that.

"The only hope the American League has is that the ganging up on the Yanks, and the team's handicaps in its own park will slow up the perennial champs . . ." The combo did slow up New York — and how!

So, while I acknowledge that my position predictions were considerably off, I must point out that my analysis of the race, and the key individuals in it, was very much on the beam. Once that faulty crystal ball is sold, I think I'll stick to analyzing, and leave the actual predictions to others.

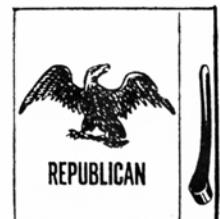

## 'A Harvest Of Defiance'

"A harvest of defiance" — thus The Atlanta Constitution described the bombing of a Jewish house of worship. The defiance referred to is that of hypocritical Southern politicians, who privately admit that integration and a full program of civil rights are inevitable, then publicly exhort their constituents to "massive resistance" against the law of the land.

The harvest belongs to the South and it seems likely to become the most grim crop reaped in Dixie in nearly a century.

We cannot completely discount the anti-Semitic overtones in bombings at Atlanta and Peoria. Indeed, B'nai B'rith's Anti-Defamation League cites anti-Semites as the planners in the bombings and the numerous threats received throughout the South in recent days.

However, there is no question that the defiant, crazed rantings of the so-called White Supremacy Councils are responsible for giving impetus to those who thirst for violence and any chance to hurt a minority group.

And the politicians, anxious only to gain electoral backing, have followed the bigots. Their tragic stand has only served to erect a massive roadblock to Southern progress. Their actions in keeping the Southern Negro a second-class citizen have only served to relegate the South to the role of a second-class industrial and economic area.

They have made the United States the steady target of race-conscious critics throughout the world. They have given immeasurable aid and comfort to the Kremlin's drive to gain converts to Communism among the uncommitted nations.

There are many right-thinking, liberal-minded people in the South. There are also many public figures who think liberally. It's time they took their thoughts out of their mind and put them in their mouth. We have a hunch the people would listen.

## SUMMER HOLIDAY IN ISRAEL

### The Song of Adullam

By BERYL SEGAL



Between the hills of Judea and the land of the ancient Philistines lies the Adullam country. Once upon a time there was a king of Adullam, and the only memory of him is preserved in the Holy Scriptures. Among the 31 kings whom Joshua and the children of Israel smote beyond the Jordan westward was the king of Adullam. His kingdom was given for an inheritance to the Tribe of Judah.

Samson, that restless man of great strength, roamed the wooded hills and wild valleys of Adullam in his never ending encounters with his enemies, the Philistines. And the shepherd boy David met the giant Goliath near Adullam. And the two most memorable stories about David the king and the singer of Psalms have their setting in the Adullam countryside.

We were children in Cheder and we were greatly disturbed by the plight of young David whom the envious king Saul wanted to destroy only because the maidens sang one to another in their play, depicting the battle of David and Goliath, in this manner:

Saul had slain his thousands. And David his ten thousands.

And now David is running away from the wrath of the jealous king Saul and he hides in the cave of Adullam. Like Robin Hood in the forests of Sherwood, so did David hide in Adullam, and:

"When his brethren and all his father's house heard it, they went down there to him. And every one that was in distress, and every one that was in debt, and every one that was discontented gathered themselves unto him, and he became captain over them, and there were with him about four hundred men."

David, King of Israel, at the head of all who were not satisfied with their lot, the rebels of his day, the non-conformists, hiding out, as outlaws in the land of Adullam.

But the most moving story, bringing tears to the eyes of children swaying over the volumes of the Book of Samuel, in the dim light of the Cheder, was the episode of the water:

"And three of the thirty chiefs went down and came to David in the harvest time unto the cave of Adullam, and the troop of the Philistines were encamped in the valley of Rephaim.

"And David longed, and said: 'Oh, that one would give me water to drink of the well of Beth-lehem which is by the gate.'

"And the three mighty men broke through the hosts of the Philistines, and drew water out of the well of Beth-lehem that was by the gate, and took it, and brought it to David. But he would not drink thereof.

"And he said 'Be it far from me, O Lord, that I should do this. Shall I drink the blood of the men that went in jeopardy of their lives?'"

"Therefore he would not drink it."

David would not drink the water he so longed to drink, because the three men fetched it at the peril of their lives. Oh, he would not hesitate to send these same men to battle with the enemy, even at the risk of their lives. So would he himself give his life for God and country. But to endanger human life for personal pleasures was an abomination in the eyes of David.

A touching story and a beautiful lesson in moral dealings with your fellow men, coming down to us from the land of Adullam of long ago.

And now we came to Adullam in the heat of an August day, an hour's journey from Jerusalem. For centuries Adullam was sparsely populated. The few Arab villages in the hills were inhabited by sheep and goat breeders. The sheep grazed the tall wild grasses, and the goats devoured every tree on the slopes.

The Adullam of Joshua, Samson, and David is now one grayish expanse of rock and wild grass and blends in color with the rocks. Only here and there does a green spot relieve the grey monotony, and the roar of a bulldozer behind the hills disturbs the oppressing silence of the mid-day heat. Israel is disturbing the centuries long sleep of Adullam with the crushing sounds of the rock busters, the clang of American-made tractors, and the song of the hammer.

The rocks must be pushed aside to clear the soil that will bring forth corn and barley as in the days of old. The slopes will be terraced and on them will grow fruit bearing trees as in the days of David. The dry beds of ancient brooks will be cleared again and refreshing water made to flow through them once more. Hundred thousand dunam of good land can be restored to life in Adullam, and 28 settlements are to be built in Adullam by 1960. Three of them are already settled by Jews from Hungary, Rumania, and Persia. The Adullam task began only last year.

But a legend is already told in Israel, about Adullam, and this new story of Adullam will be told to our children and children's children together with the stories of Samson, the mighty man, and David, the shepherd king. And when the great poet arises he will sing us the song of the Thirty-Five of Adullam, and it will be just as moving as the tale of David and the water from the well by the Gate of Beth-lehem.

And here is the story as told by the young lady who took us to see the Adullam project.

When the State of Israel came into being ten years ago there was no Jewish settlement in Adullam. The Arabs held sway in the entire Adullam country. Then came the war of 1948, the war for the existence of the new state. In January of that year word reached Jerusalem that the isolated settlement of Gush-Etzion

was hard pressed by the Arab legions. Jerusalem itself was besieged and was fighting for its life.

Then arose 35 young men of the Hagana who volunteered to come to the aid of Gush-Etzion. The only way to reach it was through Adullam. In the stillness of the night they climbed over hills and crawled among the rocks in the valleys, and they came to the Adullam country. Gush-Etzion was within sight on the opposite hill. The 35 hastened their steps. Help to Gush-Etzion must not come too late.

In a narrow pass in the hills of Adullam they were ambushed by the Arabs and none escaped alive.

On a hill overlooking that pass now stands a simple altar of stone, made of the grey stones of Adullam, and on it, hewn in the stone, are the two letters Lamed He, which in Hebrew stand for the number 35. The 35 young souls who were snuffed out in Adullam.

But the story does not end there. A stone memorial is not enough if the lives of the 35 were not to have been lost in vain. A living memorial also stands in Adullam. Students of the Hebrew University in Jerusalem settled in the valley where the monument stands and they called their Kibbutz Nosiv Ha'Lamed He, the Path of the Thirty-Five. A consecrated path.

Of such matter is the fabric of the legends told in Israel today, and these new legends will in the years to come be interwoven with the legends of old, and together they will become the brick and mortar for the great song of a people.

**Dag Hammarskjold Asks For Permanent UN Peace Force**

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. — Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold has proposed to the General Assembly the creation of a permanent, stand-by United Nations peace force which would operate, in many respects, along the lines of the United Nations Emergency Force.

Under the proposal, the Secretary General would be empowered to "sound out" member states on the number and types of military men and materiel which they would be willing to contribute to the UN force.

The UN Secretariat would have stand-by plans drawn up to fit many contingencies, and might, if it found such a step necessary, set up a military command unit from among members states. However, no actual force in permanent encampment would exist unless and until it was needed.

**Guards Borders**

UNEF has, for almost two years, acted as a UN guard between Egypt and Israel in the Gaza Strip and the Sinai Peninsula. Hammarskjold filed with the Assembly his long-awaited "summary study of the experience of UNEF" in which, in accordance with a previous promise, he spelled out his ideas for a permanent stand-by peace

force. Under Hammarskjold's plan the following four "basic principles" would guide the force:

1. No troops are to be stationed by the UN on the territory of any member state without the consent of the government concerned.

2. The UN and the country where troops may be stationed are to enter an agreement pledging to each other their "good faith." Such an agreement exists now regarding UNEF between the UN and Egypt.

3. Not only is the force to exclude military men from "permanent members," but it is also to exclude military units from states whose geographical position or special interests might have a bearing on the dispute in question.

**UN to Decide**

4. However, the United Nations itself will ultimately decide the exact composition of military units in the force. An important principle proposed is that the UN itself will decide when to withdraw its force from a country once a force had been sent into that country.

Hammarskjold formulated also a set of "basic rules" for the proposed force. A UN force, in his opinion, must confine its activities to actions that are "separate and distinct" from whatever issues concern the authorities of the country where the force is stationed. The force must not participate in any situation of a purely internal nature. The force should not be used to enforce any specific political solution.

# Tunisia Severs Diplomatic Relations With UAR

TUNIS—Strong opposition within Arab ranks to the leadership of President Gamal Abdel Nasser of the United Arab Republic broke into the open last week when Tunisia severed diplomatic relations with the UAR.

In a blistering attack on the Egyptian ruler, President Habib Bourguiba of Tunisia announced to his country's Constituent Assembly: "Yes, I am Western, and I will remain so." He charged the Egyptians with assisting men who have been plotting to assassinate him. Nasser has been harboring Salah ben Youssef, exiled opponent of Tunisia's president who has been charged with treason.

In announcing his ties with the West, Bourguiba also rejected communism, declaring: "Once the Iron Curtain drops there is no escape from communism."

**Mentions Israel**

The Tunisian president even had a good word, indirectly, for Israel: "The primary enemy, one has a habit of saying, is Israel," Bourguiba said. "However, why it is that this State is quiet while the

The break in diplomatic relations followed Tunisia's earlier walkout from the Arab League Council meeting in Cairo. Tunisia, which joined only recently, left the Council meeting following a similar walkout by the UAR. The Tunisian delegate accused the UAR of trying to dominate the smaller Arab nations and of giving shelter to enemies of Bourguiba. The Cairo representative later returned to the meeting, but the Tunisian delegate refused to do so.

In another blow to Nasser's prestige and attempts to dominate the Arab world, Great Britain announced last week that it will soon start sending small arms, field guns and aircraft to Sudan, Egypt's southern neighbor. Britain will also train Sudanese pilots to fly the British planes.

Like Tunisia, Sudan is also an Arab state which has been having trouble with Nasser. Last February, Sudan accused Egypt before the UN of moving UAR troops into Sudanese territory. Egypt later withdrew and the crisis came to an end.

Tunisia's move, which also aroused the sympathy of King Mohammed V of Morocco, and Sudan's decision to purchase British arms, were viewed as heavy setbacks to Nasser. The break with Tunisia was seen in some quarters as Nasser's biggest loss of prestige since Israel's army routed the Egyptians in Sinai two years ago.

The Bourguiba incident made it clear that Nasser is not the only authoritative voice of Arab nationalism. Fear in other Arab na-

tions, including Syria, of Nasser domination, has been evident, and new outbreaks of anti-Nasser sentiment among the Arabs may be expected, according to some observers.

Rep. Robert W. Kean, New Jersey Republican, said in Newark that "every American has a stake in these indecent acts. We must react with cold determination and a willingness to approve the necessary laws." Rep. Kean called for "tough Federal laws cracking down on terrorists."

Lehman, in a comment on the wave of synagogue bombings and threats against Jewish and Christian religious institutions, declared that responsibility for these extremist developments must be shared by all who "advocate overt resistance" to the rule of the law. He spoke at the 14th annual conference of the Metropolitan Council of B'nai B'rith.

**Israel Paper Mill Receives Credit**

NEW YORK — The Export-Import Bank recently awarded to American Israeli Paper Mills, Ltd., a \$3,000,000 credit to assist in financing purchases of pulp paper and manufacturing equipment in the United States. The loan will be repayable in 14 semi-annual installments, beginning in 1961. The loan will be applied to the purchase of \$4,800.00 worth of American equipment. The balance will be obtained through credits from United States suppliers and from the sale of stock, according to a spokesman for American Israeli Paper Mills. The company has already embarked on a \$10.-300,000 expansion program.

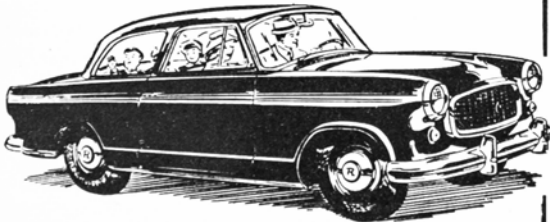

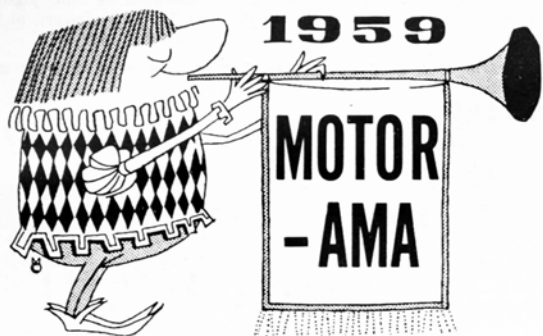

## New Knesset Building Dedicated

JERUSALEM — The laying of a cornerstone for a permanent Knesset Building took place here last week in the presence of President Itzhak Ben Zvi, Premier David Ben Gurion, and members of the Rothschild family from England and France. The construction of the building was made possible by the bequest of 6,000,000 pounds made by the late Lord James de Rothschild.

The widow of Lord James laid the stone, after a metal cylinder was deposited in it containing a scroll reciting, in Biblical Hebrew, a brief history of the building and its meaning to Israel and to the world. The scroll was signed by the President, Premier, the Chief Rabbis, members of the Cabinet, Mayor Gershon Agron, members of the Rothschild family and other Israeli personalities.

The ceremony was opened by Joseph Sprinzak, Speaker of the Knesset. President Ben Zvi, addressing the audience lauded the generosity of the donor, a scion of the late Baron Edmund de Rothschild, who is known as "the Father of the Yishuv." Mrs. de Rothschild, in a moving speech, expressed hope that in the new Knesset building "just, good and wise laws will be passed in the spirit of the People of the Book and eternal values."

Later in the evening, Premier

Ben Gurion spoke at a gala dinner given in honor of the House of Rothschild, and paid a special tribute to the Baron Edmund who, over 75 years ago, established an agricultural community in Palestine which laid the foundation for the State of Israel.
